FAMOUS 'CON MEN' PASSING

Looking at Joe's white hair, it was hard to realize that he was the same person who, with the notorious Tom O'Brien, wrote a \$1000 bill from Oscar Wilde, in America, on a visit, was at the death of his fiancée as a writer.

Then the victim would put the money supposedly needed to develop the property. He has passed on; likewise have "Doc" Trueman, the imposing looking old sharp, who by appearance resembled F. Zanone's attorney of that time; Ed. Lee McCurdy; Larry O'Brien, known as the "Red" who broke the bank of Monte Carlo and who was the inspiration for the popular song, "As He Walks Along the Bois de Boulogne" with an independent mind and Spanish face.

The Gibby home, Broadway, was the center of high-grade con activity from Bill Trueman's place across Broadway to "Doc" Taylor's place close to the Salvation Army. Only a few days ago there died at one of the leading hotels in New York a man who was known as "Doc" "ready" in the profession. He was a well dressed and came from Canada. His scheme was to approach a man of known means and tell him of a "mine" in the States. A few hours later he would appear and toss \$500 or \$1000 in the man's hands, remaining "four" windings. That would establish the friendly relationship after which he would try the victim for thousands. He was given the mine and not a half-dozen who attended it knew his astounding past history.
