



**Position Handed Down by Supreme Justice Taft is Vital to Labor.**

**OVERRULES LAW OF ARIZONA**

State of that State is held in violation of the Federal Constitutional Guarantees of Equal Protection Under the Law.

In a sweeping decision handed down by Chief Justice Taft, an Arizona state law prohibiting the issuance of injunctions by courts in picketing cases during labor disputes was held invalid by the United States Supreme court because it violated the federal Constitution's guarantee of equal protection under the law and prohibition against the taking of property without due process of law.

In the case brought by William Triax of Bisbee, proprietor of an eating house, who was picketed because he refused to put operators on an eight-hour day for his cooks and waiters as demanded by organized labor, it was held by the court that the law was unconstitutional because it was an unlawful, or if the means used are unlawful, or if the means used are unlawful, or if the means used are unlawful.

The plaintiff's business is a property right, said the court, and free access for employees, servants and customers to his place of business is incident to such right. Intentional injury caused to either right or both by picketing is a tort. Obstruction of access is a conspiracy, if its object is unlawful, or if the means used are unlawful, or if the means used are unlawful.

The court split, five to four, on the decision. Associate Justices Holmes, Brandeis, Pitney and Clark dissented, and the first three dissenters expressed similar grounds for their inability to concur in the majority decision.

The Missouri Pacific closed its five construction shops for an indefinite period because of business depression.

The action was an economic measure, it was stated.

The Swiss national council, after a long and arduous debate, adopted a bill providing that franchises of revolution or of general strikes, henceforth shall be published with imprisonment.

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**CALLS FOR WAR ON RATS**

Why the Pests Should Be Extirminated is Shown by New York Business Association.

While the cost of living may have come down somewhat, the spread of the rat infestation has increased. It is estimated that the pest is costing the city of New York \$1,000,000 a year.

The amount covers only the feeding of the country's rats and does not take into account the damage done by them for which they are responsible. The rat prevention committee of the Building and Construction Trades Department is calling the attention of members to the depredations of the rats, in a bulletin just issued, which says:

"The upsurge of this pest has gone up a year or so ago some one figured that it costs us \$150 per person to feed the rats in this city. It is estimated that the pest is costing the city of New York \$1,000,000 a year, which is a terrific figure for a pest that is so common and so easily exterminated."

The pest is a menace.

**GENERAL LABOR NEWS**

A 75 per cent reduction has been achieved in the forces of the repair shops of the Middle and Ohio railroads at Mobile, Ala.

Unemployment has decreased by at least 1,500,000 as a direct result of the national conference on unemployment which was held in Washington.

Hearing on the injunction provided for by the Pennsylvania railroad against the Philadelphia labor board was postponed by the court at Chicago.

The Philadelphia and Reading, railway company posted notices regarding the cut wages of maintenance-of-way employees from 5 to 15 cents an hour. Conference are to be held to fix the rates.

Representatives of eleven of the large paper manufacturing companies of the United States and Canada are employing more than twelve thousand workers, made application to a board of arbitration.

More than a thousand ship workers were thrown out of employment at Knoxville, Tenn., when the Southern Railway closed its machine shop and suspended all work until January 8 because of lack of traffic, according to an announcement by officials of the road.

The Associated Contractors of Massachusetts with a membership covering the entire state, by formal vote declared that the Federal Construction Industry must be overruled in 1922. They voted also not to permit unions to negotiate with the industry to dictate working conditions or to accept a discussion of the labor budget. The decision is a major step in the direction of establishing precedents to govern industrial warfare.

An injunction restraining the Building Trades council and the St. Louis local of the International Brotherhood of Bricklayers from interfering with the work of Bedford (Ind.) stone at St. Louis and in the vicinity was issued by Judge Farn of the Federal District court on the application of Stone & Donnelly and other stone companies near Bedford.

Opposition will be made to the proposed wage cut of the Missouri, Kansas & Texas railroad, and the union will be taken up with the railroad labor board, according to W. E. Williams, assistant to the road's chief engineer.
