This huge region was under Russian domination until 1867 when the United States purchased it for \$7,200,000, or less than two cents an acre. There was some grumbling at the time by a few congressmen over "adding a refrigerator to the United States." But the refrigerator has been found to be well stocked with gold, coal, forests and fisheries.

profitable investment Hawaii, like Alaska, is a regular territory. In 1893 there was a successful revolution against the Hawaiian queen, and a provisional government was formed under American protection. In 1898, at the request of the population, Hawaii was annexed to the United States. Porto Rico, Guam and the Philippines were ceded to the United States in 1899 as a result of the Spanish-American war. Porto Rico and the Philippines are dependencies and not territories. Their local affairs are administered by a legislature of two houses and they are represented commissioners elected by the legislatures. Guam is under the control of navai officers in command of naval stations. Under

similar naval control are the Tutuila group and Samoa, which were ceded in 1899 by Great Britain and Germany. Then there is the Panama Ca na! Zone which was purchased from Panama in 1904 for \$10, 000,000. This is governed by the Isthmian Canal commission The year 1917 saw the purchase from Denmark of the Virgin Islands, for \$25,000,000. These aggregate only 150 square miles and are temporarily gov-






