## Tax Collections Close To \$500,000

Slight Delinquency in Final Collections - Belief That Some of the Taxpayers Are Awaiting Outcome of The Mill Levy - Howe Warns That Town Will Charge Interest of Nine Per Cent.

Close to half a million dollars have been collected by Tax Collector George H. Howe under the fourteen mill levy, according to figures procured at the office of the collector. The total amount collected is \$463,000, which is about \$15,000 short of the amount to be collected on the town's grand list. In considering the controversy over the additional three mill levy this is exceptional work on the part of Collector Howe and this year's record is in keeping with the standards set by Mr. Howe during the past years of his administration. It is admitted that the list of tax payers is a mistake to think that Germany must be kept down at all costs as it is to lay down an important part of any machine and expect the machine to run as usual. Crockett, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce of New York, the corporation that installed the efficiency system in the mills of Cheney Brothers.

The Town of Manchester is practically immune from small pox epidemic. This despite the fact that the disease is now raging in several sections of the state. The Board of Health has issued warnings to all parents to take extra-ordinary measures to prevent the disease from gaining a foothold in Connecticut. That the Board of Health, mindful of the welfare of the town, started a campaign with the opening of the schools last Fall and all residents, and especially parents, may feel quite secure in the announcement of Dr. D. C. Y. Moore, chairman of the board, that: "We feel that the Town of Manchester is immune from the small pox epidemic, so far as vaccination is concerned. We have endeavored to protect the town from a possible spread of the disease, not only by vaccination by other methods, and present conditions indicate that we have been successful. I feel that the people of Manchester have nothing to worry about."

## POSTAL REGULATIONS

The post office department has announced the following amendments to the Postal Laws and Regulations, concerning undesirable postal and post cards:

Undesirable postal and post cards, on which the sender has placed in the upper left corner of the address side a request for their return together with his name and address and pledge to pay the return postage, may be returned by the postmaster at the office of address to the sender at another post office rated with 1 cent postage due on each to be collected on delivery in the manner set forth in amended section 637, Postal Laws and Regulations, whether such cards bear written or printed messages.

Undesirable postal and post cards deposited for local delivery are returnable to the sender without additional charge for postage when they bear his card address, as provided by the first sentence of paragraph 1, section 624, of the regulations.

Undesirable postal and post cards not bearing in the upper left corner of the address side a request for their return together with the name and address of the sender and a pledge to pay the return postage, except such as are above referred to for local delivery, shall be treated as presorted mail when they bear his card address, as provided by the first sentence of paragraph 1, section 624, Postal Laws and Regulations.

For the treatment of double postal cards which are undeliverable see paragraph 2, section 624, Postal Laws and Regulations.

**WHY CAN WE COMPETE**  
ABROAD  
"As it is possible for American manufacturers, employing labor at high wages, to compete in Africa and South America and Asia with European manufacturers employing labor at low wages?"  
This question was recently put to Samuel M. Vaulsain, head of the Buleva Locomotive Works. Mr. Vaulsain's answer was unequivocally affirmative. He did not base his optimism on wage deflation, whatever he may think about the need of that. He based it on the American manufacturer's superior equipment in labor-saving machinery. And his reply is a message of hope to every business man in this country.  
"No country can compete with German manufacturers on a cash basis in Europe," said Mr. Vaulsain. "Only those manufacturers can compete who can extend credit where it must be extended, for German cannot meet that demand. But in other countries I am confident that we can meet German competition even though German mechanics can lend for about fifty cents a day, while we pay ours more than that an hour. In fact, I am almost sure that we can extend credit much to better effect, but I saw nothing that the American manufacturer need be afraid of."—The Nation's Business.

### POSTAL LETTER ISSUED BY POSTMASTER WALL

Writes Hints for Postal Patrons—L. R. Burr Makes Mail Train Section.  
Recently the post office department requested postmasters to issue from time to time letters to patrons giving information of value to those who use the postal service.  
Complying with these directions, Postmaster Fred H. Wall of the Manchester office issued the following:  
**Post Office Patrons**  
Manchester, Conn., May 4, 1922  
The postal business for 1922 at Manchester is expected to be a very busy year. This means that a public finds the parcel post a economical and satisfactory method of shipping goods. A parcel post will be dispatched to any point in Connecticut or Massachusetts for 10 cents. Deliveries are made at 10 o'clock in the morning. On for the normal school? Oh for a mother's joy at home! Send a parcel post. Hundreds are already doing this. (Send clothing and other necessities that way.)  
Send anything mailable in parcel post. If your parcel is too heavy, it is worth wrapping and packing properly. See how in mind these hints:  
1. Write or print a plain address with ink.  
2. Place return address in upper left-hand corner.  
3. Enclose articles liable to breakage in corrugated paper or wooden boxes and pack in bubble or similar substance.  
4. If contents are perishable or fragile mark the package conspicuously or have mailman check it for you.  
5. Think of the miles it must travel, rubbing against other parcels, handled and re-handled.  
6. When ready to mail, give the "once over" to these points: Address. Return address. Contents. Weight. Postage. Postmark.  
7. Mail it early in the day.  
8. Insure it.  
9. Train to Mail Office.  
10. Say to Mr. Burr, head of the Burr Nursery, a day or two ago: "Say, do you know that Train No. 45, leaving Manchester at 11:30 a. m., is a mighty good one to mail on? Yesterday we sent on that train in out-going mail a letter for an agent in Chicago. It reached destination in time to reach the first delivery this morning and we had telegraphic reply noon today. That's quick reply."  
Suggestions Welcomed.  
Patrons of the post office are entitled to prompt, efficient and courteous service. If you see points wherein the methods and management can be improved, the postmaster wants to hear about it, at the stamp window.
