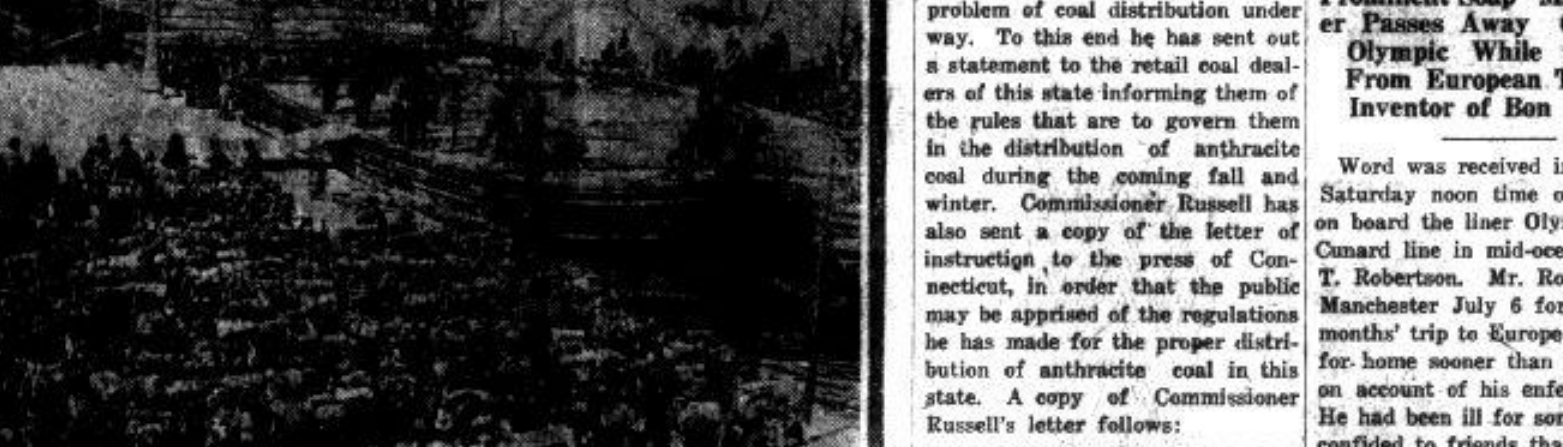

While business has made tremendous strides it has by no means reached anything like its full potential. The fact that important concerns like the U. S. Steel Corporation and Bethlehem Steel have not earned the dividends paid on their common stock during the past year seems sufficient proof.

Another point in favor of this belief is that the copper industry, one of our greatest, has not gotten back on a paying basis. To this list could be added General Electric, American Sugar, New York Air Brake and many others.

When the question is asked by many, "Then under existing conditions and higher values how can we look for further advance?" Our best answer would be that following the unprecedented liquidation in all lines, retrenchment was carried to the extreme point.

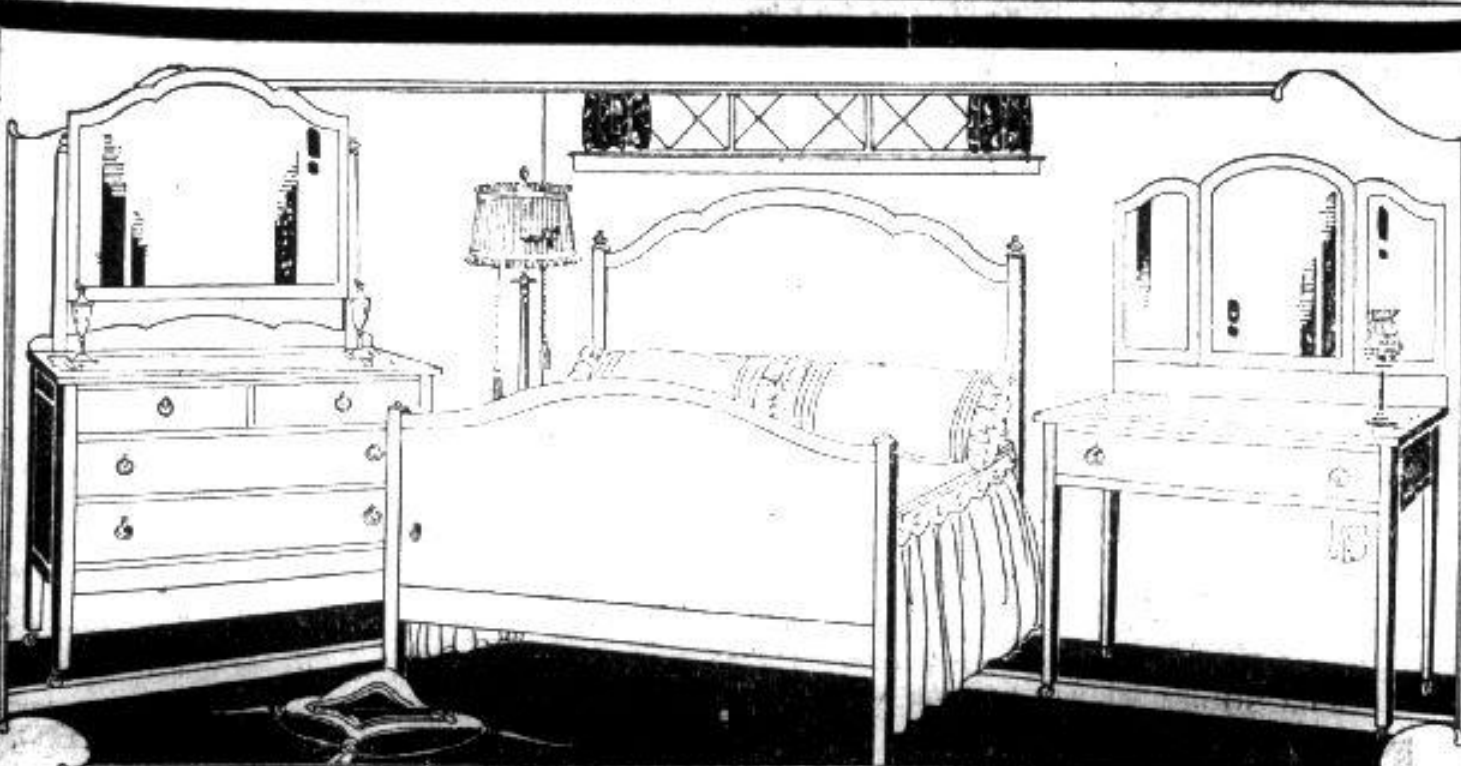
