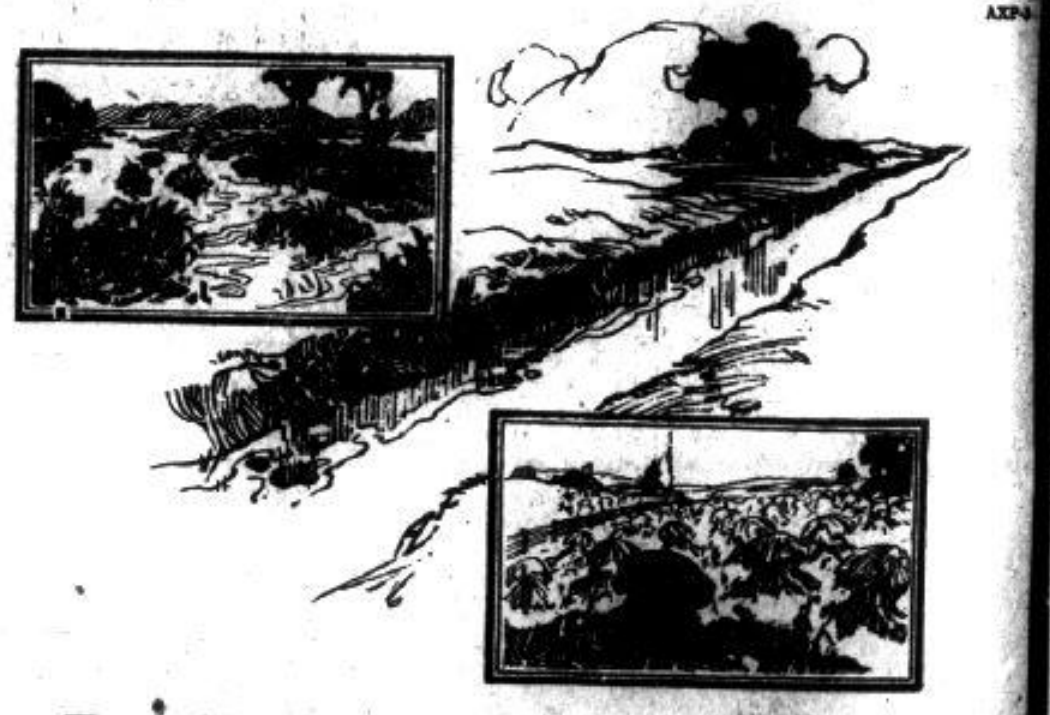

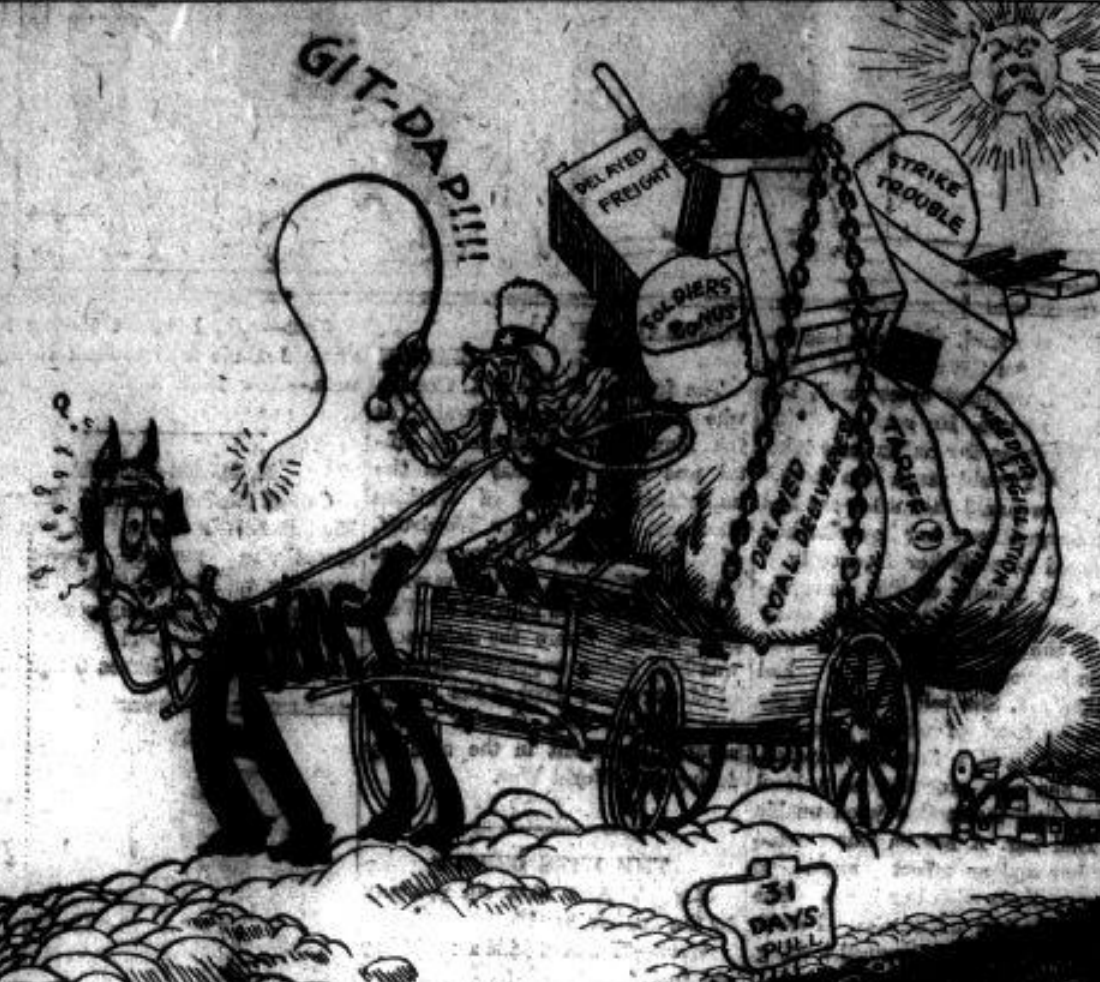

## TOWN WILL BUILD ITS OWN CONDUITS FOR SIGNAL WIRES

Proposition of Southern New England Telephone Company Not to Be Accepted—Might Prove Dangerous to Service to Remove Signal Wires From Ducts, Says Heebner—Installation to Cost Only \$4,700 One Half of Which Will Be Borne by Fire District. The board of selectionmen will not accept the proposition of the Southern New England Telephone Company to loan the town the use of an extra conduit for the wires of the South Manchester Fire Department and of the proposed new signal system seems probable from the attitude assumed by the board at last night's meeting. The reason for this is that upon presentation by Superintendent L. N. Heebner of the fire alarm telegraph system of certain figures whereby the town can put in its own conduit and obviate the inconvenience and possible disruption of the fire alarm or police signal service during the time that the Telephone company might be making repairs, it seemed better to have the town install a conduit, one-half the cost of which would be borne by the district. It will be remembered that at a meeting of the highway committee of the board of selectionmen and certain officials of the Southern New England Telephone Company last week the telephone officials pointed out that there was an extra duct between the Center and Charter Oak street, that was available for the wires spoken of above.
