NEW TRADE SCHOOL BUILDING WILL BE BUILT ON SCHOOL ST.

Franklin School for Junior High School—Plan Obviates for Some Years Necessity of Putting up Expensive Building.

A new building to house the growing Trade School and to leave space available in the Franklin School for the proposed Junior High School is being contemplated and although it will be two years perhaps before such a building will be ready for occupancy nevertheless plans are being prepared for such a structure as will prove to be a far more ideal building for Trade School purposes than the present quarters can offer.

If the plan goes through the building will be located on the vacant lot east of the present Steam Heating Plant on School street where there is a frontage of 150 feet and a depth of about 100 feet. In the building the following departments will be taken care of: Carpenter shop, tool shop, machine shop, electric shop, metal shop, drafting department and classrooms for mathematics and other theoretical subjects.

Increased Registration Cannot be Handled by Present Force Supt. Verplank Declares—Total Teaching Body Now 20.

Another high school teacher will be added to the South Manchester High School faculty as a result of a decision reached by the Ninth District School committee at a meeting held on Wednesday evening. Superintendent F. A. Verplank presented facts and figures showing that the total number of pupils this year has increased to 103 over last year's total registration of 94.

At first thought it would seem that there is still a low percentage of teachers for the total registration but it must be borne in mind that a number of those registered as high school pupils are taking the co-operative high school trade school courses and are being taught by state teachers.

**"SPRING" WATER**

IS DANGEROUS

State Health Department Points Out That Typhoid and Other Diseases Come From "Spring" Water.

Within the last ten months two separate outbreaks of illness have been apparently caused by the use of water, from supposed "springs" which investigation has disclosed to be the "bubbling seeps" from the pipes with open joints, laid beneath the surface of marshy fields to drain them. Bacteriological and chemical examination of the water at the State Laboratory showed the water from both of the supposed springs to be heavily polluted.

In one instance, nine cases of typhoid fever followed the use of the "spring" water which was used to wash the milk utensils of a milk dealer.

In the other instance, one case of typhoid and six cases of dysentery occurred when seven individuals drank water from the unsterilized "spring."

It is possible that there exists in the state similar instances of fields which have been underdrained and which, in rainy weather, carry such a flow of water it bubbles forth at the lower end of the drains and resembles a spring. Certain health officers have suggested that a survey be made of fields that are known to be underdrained to see if such "springs" are present.

**LAND AND AIR**

Point Made by Henry George May Yet Be Made the Center of Legal Controversy.

In the course of a lecture in the hall at Aston-under-Lyme, Eng., the late Henry George put his audience in roars of laughter when he remarked: "The man who crosses the land over the air as well as there has been only one attempt that I have ever heard of to make air separate property. Near Strasbourg, in Germany, about the Twelfth or Thirteenth century, there was a convent of monks who put up a windmill. Rees will have invaded the tangle lives near Grays Harbor, Wash., and steal and carry away the honey to their hives in the forest. More than one-third of the domestic honey gathered in this district has been stolen by the robber bees. The wild bees make their homes in hollow trunks and cedar trees, where several swarms work on a community basis.
