BUCKLAND YOUTH KILLED WHEN AUTO PLUNGES THROUGH FENCE

Charles Leworaki, 19 years old, of North Main street, Buckland, was instantly killed on Sunday evening about 6:30 when a Cleveland touring car which he was driving left the highway, just south of the Woodburns. After bridging on Adams street and plunging through the fence at the side of the road was wrecked and thrown into the meadow below the road. Two other occupants of the car, Miss Bertha Golas of Hilliard street and Lucie Strawn of Buckland, escaped injury but Leworaki was impaled by a tree by the fence top that came through the front of the car and was driven through the driver's chest. The rear of the car was driven back about a foot and a half.
