



## WONDERFUL EXHIBIT OF EASTERN PAINTINGS AT SCHOOL ST. REC.

**Women's Clubs of Manchester Have Secured Large Number of Miss Gertrude Hadenfeldt's Works Depicting China, India and Western Tibet.**

A Memorial exhibit for a town the size of Manchester was opened at the South Manchester School under the auspices of the Educational Club together with the Canton Chinese College. Today a super-machine, under the direction of a scientific organization, has made it possible to produce scrolls at a reasonable price so that persons in the Orient can afford to buy them. They enjoy unique opportunities of seeing places that are of little interest to the average person. She lives for years in Kashi, India, and has traveled through the Hindoo fastnesses to Western Tibet. In Lhasa she had to learn the art of making the delicate batik and tie-dye before she could make most of the scrolls of the Orient.

Miss Gertrude Hadenfeldt, a native of New Haven, Conn., has been born in her invention and her power of organization.
