## TOWN MEETING TABLES BUILDING LINE BY-LAW

### VOTERS FAVOR DRY BROOK REMOVAL

#### HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES PASSED BILL YESTERDAY FOR RAISE OF COURT OFFICIALS PAY

Representative Smith's Resolution Went to Senate Under Suspension of Rules—Held Up There With Others to Receive \$1,500 Annually.

The bill recently presented by Representative Robert J. Smith of Manchester providing for a raise in the salaries of the officials of the town court of Manchester yesterday passed the House of Representatives at Hartford and was forwarded to the Senate under a suspension of the rule. However when the bill reached the Senate it was held up with several others by Senator John N. Brooks who said that he was opposed to a suspension of the rules unless good reason could be shown. The Senate therefore tabled action on these bills and they will come up in their regular course on the calendar.

#### Appropriate \$30000 to Put Storm Water Menace Underground—Approve Lighting Contract.

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### Use Your Auto The Year Round

**It Can Be Done If Precautions Are Taken.**

Your automobile during the winter months. No one has to be discouraged to use his car during these months of the year. In some parts of the country the climate is so mild that winter driving presents no problems. Even in the coldest climates the practice of using the car up for the winter months is increasingly disappearing. When the thermometer registers below zero and heavy snows fall—where conditions are such that the automobile is becoming a year-round convenience.

Cold weather, however, does bring about a situation in automobile driving which calls for adaptation to the part of a driver of a car. There are certain changes in the method of operating a motor which must be adhered to in order to get the best results. A little consideration of these changes and an application of ordinary sense means that all that should be necessary.

Manufacturers have gone a long way toward making winter driving easy by adding improvements on carburetors, heating devices and the like. The increased use of closed cars makes cold weather driving much more comfortable. Two things are necessary if the car is to be operated in winter, the first of which is some device for heating the engine. The second is a device for heating the car.

Many things have been tried for heating the engine in winter. The most common are salt, glycerine and alcohol. Any one of these will insure against freezing. The salt is the most desirable because it has a tendency to set up electric action where iron and brass parts are combined in the cooling system, but four pounds of salt to the gallon will give a solution which will not freeze until 17 degrees below zero Fahrenheit is reached. Glycerine will keep the engine from freezing, but it is so corrosive and if rubber hose is used to connect radiator and the cylinder pump, glycerine will cause it to become rapidly.

Denatured alcohol probably is the best to use, mixed with water in proportion of one part of alcohol to two parts of water. It will keep the engine from freezing above zero, 30 per cent of alcohol will give protection down to 9 degrees below zero, and

labor covers are a convenience. These must not make the engine stop, but they will protect him only for the average low temperature of his locality. For 30 years the average minimum for the vicinity of New York City was 12 degrees above zero. Denatured alcohol boils at about 170 degrees while water boils at 212 degrees. More quickly than the water and when refilling the radiator a solution of 75 per cent alcohol to 25 per cent water should be used. Wood alcohol boils at 146 degrees and the alcohol does not act as good for a non-freezing mixture as denatured alcohol. Half alcohol and half glycerine added to the water raises the boiling point of the solution so that evaporation is lessened and the mixture is especially good where the car is equipped with a thermostat to control the temperature of the cooling medium.

Another thing which must be taken into account in winter is the method of operating a motor. The carburetor and the intake pipe should be kept warm. The gasolene will vaporize and form an explosive mixture. Modern cars are provided with means for accomplishing this when the engine has started, but the hot-water jacket and the hot-air furnace are not available, and for starting other means must be devised.

There also are various devices for heating the carburetor and for heating the cooling system in winter. The most common are salt, glycerine and alcohol. Any one of these will insure against freezing.
