VILLA, MEXICAN CHIEFTAIN, MURDERED

"As the former bandit chief lay behind the wheel of his wrecked car the six murderers advanced, firing as they came."

"They were screaming as they neared Villa, who had fled every revolver bullet."

Villa uttered one cry—a cry of pain. His companions, wounded and trapped, were pleading for mercy.

"The voices of the murderers cleared to us above the sound of their guns. Shuddering above Villa six men rushed forward to the left of his seat, and he died."

"Then they turned and calmly walked away. They reached the shattered house, from which the sound of gunshots came, where the leader turned and fired a single shot at Villa. The slayers disappeared."

MacDonald Wilson, ex-president of the underworld, would have captured the six assassins had they used ordinary efforts.

"In the opinion of the New American, six men left by a rear door of the shattered house, walked to the river bank, and then rode away on horses they had waiting there."

"I am sure that the house had looked fresh months before by a little old man who posed as a grain and hay merchant," MacDonald said. "During the time before the killing, the old man came to the house, living there on canned foods they had brought with them. Not one ventured outside during that time."

"I counted Villa's wounds—eleven shots had entered his body," Wilson said, adding to his partner's account of the murder.

"Authorities allowed Villa's body and that of his secretary, Col. Miguel Diaz, to lay where the dead fell for one hour," continued Wilson.

"There was but little mourning over Villa's death—neither was there a spirit of sympathy expressed, as far as I can see," the "Terror of the North."

"While the mourners, headed by Hipolito Villa, brother of the slain man, gathered at the cemetery, the New American, July 20, 1930, Villa's ex-secretary of Parral had attended the services, and other prominent citizens many residents lined the town streets to bid him a final adieu.
