

**GERMANY'S SHIPPING**  
The outstanding fact in the ship building portion of the world is the rapid recovery of the German ship fleet, says A. Farrell in *The Nation's Business*. When the war opened, Germany held second rank in the shipping world, yielding precedence to Great Britain. But the war was so long that many ships practically disappeared from the list of oceanic traders.

But she has been climbing steadily, until today she is probably in the first place, provided that continuation of her present record will bring her into third rank with a practically short time.

Within two years after the war, Germany had increased the 460,000 tons of shipping lost by the Treaty of Versailles to more than 2,000,000 tons, a gain of 16 per cent., and her program of maritime recovery will under way. She was then only sixth, instead of fifth, in the world.

Since 1918, Germany has built about 1,500,000 tons of new ships, her percentage of world construction was 21.1 in 1919, double that of 1918, and in 1927 she will have 10,000,000 tons of shipping, making her a competitor last year, only to be beaten again, this year, by Great Britain, leading the way in average under construction, an advantage which she will probably retain.

According to the report of a special committee on construction at the International Conference of Commerce, in Geneva, Professor Egonius of the University of Lund, Sweden, said that Germany would grow another half million tons in the next three years.

The German shipbuilding industry, while it has suffered, has not been destroyed. The large yards, especially those of Gdynia, Kiel, Wilhelmshaven, Hamburg, and Bremen, are still in full operation, though the smaller yards, which were able to get away with their small yards, have largely closed down and rapidly moved toward complete recovery of their pre-war maritime status.
