Not All Members Are Out of the Mines and Mills, Survey Shows—Some Rich and Learned.

London, Aug. 14.—The most remarkable thing about the Labor Party in the House of Commons is that its percentage of aristocrats and men of high education is as high as that of any other party in the assembly.

The Labor delegation consists of only practical miners and men who have worked in the mills but who are practical learning, men of high social distinction.

FATAL "BLACK DAMP" STUFFS OUT LIVES OF 102 COAL MINERS

But 34 Survivors of 137 Who Enter Return Alive to Mouth of Mine When Spark Sets of Blast in Frontier Mine of Western State—Grief-Crazed Relatives of Dead Workers Restrained by Barriers From Flinging Themselves Into Fatal Pit.

Kennerly, Wyo., Aug. 15.—One hundred and two dead is the toll today of the terrific explosion in Frontier Mine No. 1, of the Kennerly Coal Company, which exploded 87 men and shook the countryside yesterday shortly after the miners had entered the mine for the day.

Thirty-five men were rescued alive but one died as he was being taken out. "Black Damp," the coal miner's menace—was blamed for the blast that trapped them in the slopes.

It was a gruesome sight that greeted the mining victors at the Old Fellows Hall and Fitzpatrick's Undertaking Rooms to-day where the victims of the explosion were strewn out under white canvas while officials of the mine checked their identities.

Twenty-two of the twenty-seven were taken out alive. Nadi and David died but efforts to rescue other imprisoned men.

Identification is easy. As the bodies were slowly uncoiled at the morgue a few showed signs of being slightly injured in the explosion.
