When American and municipal authorities raided the offices of the "Shanghai Sports," a magazine established by Stein and his associates, Stein and Maloney, who founded the "Sports," were of British, Chinese, Japanese and Russian nationalities, as well as American.

According to Husar, the Steins acted as clearing houses for arms dealers that sent into millions of dollars worth of munitions of all kinds of ammunition and firearms, including machine guns and field pieces.

**RUN INTO MILITARY**

On Aug. 17, 1922, a raid was initiated between Stein and Chang Tsu-hsia, amounted to \$100,000, according to documents in the hands of Husar.

Stein's letters and contracts also show that Kearney was connected with importing and selling munitions of war which have since led to various lawsuits, military seizures and border disputes.

Husar says that the arrest of Stein and his associates came as a surprise to him, but that he had been informed that Shanghai was to be the center of a plot to seize the "Sports" and that the Steins had been arrested.

"We will see the International Tribunal in Geneva to get the Steins released," he said.

He is to appear before the International Court of Justice in Geneva on Aug. 20.
