**STEUBENVILLE QUIET  
AFTER WEEK'S RIOT**

Steubenville, O., Aug. 18.—State, county and city officials joined to end, after a peaceful night, Steubenville's outbreaks of violence and riot between members of the Ku Klux Klan and white townpeople, in the belief that the present phase of the trouble was over, and the situation well under control.

Klanzans last night held an "invitation Klunkie" at Kneehill, a small town 11 miles back in the country, and quieted the Klan and white disorders. The Klan men had asked protection, but were assured by the sheriff that no trouble was likely. They held their meeting at the Kneehill Hotel to Steubenville early this morning.

A similar meeting held at Lisbon near here last night, was concluded peacefully and without disorder of any kind.

Major Donahue told International News by telephone that he believed the situation was well in hand, that he anticipated no more trouble, and only an "unrestful" night.

Steubenville declared today that while Steubenville never was a "Sunday School town," it is not now or has been quieted."
