NEW REGULATIONS

Rig of way is specifically denied vehicles entering public highways from private ways under legislation adopted by the recent session of the Legislature. The bill, which makes violations on public highways to solicit contributions or alms is made punishable by a \$50 fine.

The new legislation, which came into effect July 1, is the result of the steady increase in motor vehicles operated on Connecticut highways, as well as changes in the law to meet other conditions of the time, according to the department of motor vehicles.

In the past two years, it was found in a booklet on motor vehicle laws, issued by the department, that the bill was passed in 1922.

Makes a licensed operator structuring an unlicensed operator in the operation of a motor vehicle responsible for the operation thereof. Section 32.

Makes it legal to use an additional light on the rear of a motor vehicle as a signaling device. See, Sec. 41 (a).

The provision for the release on his own recognizance of any person arrested for a violation of motor vehicle laws has been broadened to include resident owners, as well as operators, residing in any state the proper authorities of which allow the same. Section 33.

This section also provides that the state to receive and non-resident's registration certificate or operator's license if he fails to appear for trial, when notified, further providing that whenever the operator fails to appear in court, such agreement with the court of justice of such agreement with another state, such non-resident shall be released upon his trial.

In addition to motor vehicle inspectors, any officer attached to any organized police department, or any state police officer is authorized to take abandoned motor vehicles into their custody. See, Sec. 58.

NOIN DAY STOCKS

New York, Aug. 20.—Following a firm and active opening a heavy tone developed in the forenoon and continued through the market, day, Leather and Tobacco stocks were exceptions, showing a firm tone. Products Advanced 4%, 15% and Central Leather 4% to 18%.

Copper stocks were irregular, Anacrona dropping 4% to 40% and Utah Copper advanced 4% to 60%.

Railroad stocks were lower, New York and Boston 2%, and Southern Railway .5% to 32% and Union Pacific over 1 point to 100%.

Conn. Experiment Station Issues Bulletin

The following bulletin has just been issued by the Connecticut Experiment Station at New Haven, written by W. E. Britton, State Entomologist. It is an authentic and in every way reliable work.

Unsprayed apple trees throughout Connecticut are now turning brown on account of injury by the Apple Root Borer. The insect (Hemipterous parasite, *Clerodex*) breeds each year, another brood is to follow and considerable further injury may be expected.

It is an European insect first discovered in this country in Westchester County, New York, in 1871. It first appeared in Connecticut at Weston and Stamford late in 1898, since then it has spread rapidly over the State and as far as Amherst, Massachusetts. Further information regarding habitat and life history may be obtained by consulting Bulletin No. 246 of this station.
