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Strike Suicidal to Both Sides
Says Coal Commission Chairman

John Hays Hammond Tells Newspaper Men Anthracite Industry Would Suffer Heavily in Future Markets—Administration Has No Intention of Intervening However He Asserts.

Washington, Aug. 25. Definite reasons why the administration should believe that a strike in the anthracite fields next month, were given by John Hays Hammond, chairman of the United States Coal Commission in a conference with newspapermen here today.

Hammond said to strike would be suicidal to both operators and miners because they would suffer heavily in loss of future markets.

There is no question of the sincerity of the operators to come to some arrangement with miners, Hammond said. The answer is in the fact that no one does his full part until he sees the other side is doing its part.

The operators are confronted with the fact that they are unable to lose their market in the future after the public has experimented and found substitutes available for hard coal.

Such a situation means that when the mines do come back to work they will be able to labor only part time as the market for anthracite coal will be cut down materially.

The representative of the operators and miners cannot afford to face this situation, Hammond said. "They know that they will lose in the future if a strike occurs."

At the same time Hammond reiterated that the administration has no intention of intervening in the anthracite coal strike.

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STRIKE MUST NOT COME
COAL OPERES ARE WARNED

Pinchot Tells Representatives of Warring Groups That Public Will Not Tolerate Suspension of Anthracite Mining—Critical Point Reached Today at Harrisburg Meeting of Miners and Operators.

Harrisburg, Pa., Aug. 27.—Fresh notes on outbreaks in the Spanish army mounting activity by Communists, were reported in Harrisburg today.
