**OPENING OF SCHOOLS**

The first eight school districts of the town opened the fall session this morning with reports of good attendance. The Ninth Ward will resume classes tomorrow morning in connection with the strike. Our attention has been called to the fact that every child in town should be vaccinated before entering school. A state law is in effect which will occupy a school room for a year during which time the first time should be given a certificate showing that the vaccination has been performed by a physician or by a licensed nurse. No child should make vaccination unavoidable. It is stated that children who do not show the certificate of vaccination or the excuse for not having it will not be allowed to enter school.
