**PLUMBING PERMITS SHOW A LARGE INCREASE FROM 117 TO 228.**

Last year there were 7,100 quartz and mill gold in the town amounting to \$1,000,000. For the year's sales, 27 per cent was pasteurized and 44 per cent from tuberculin tested cows. The number of permits issued, however, has been increased from 62 to 84.
