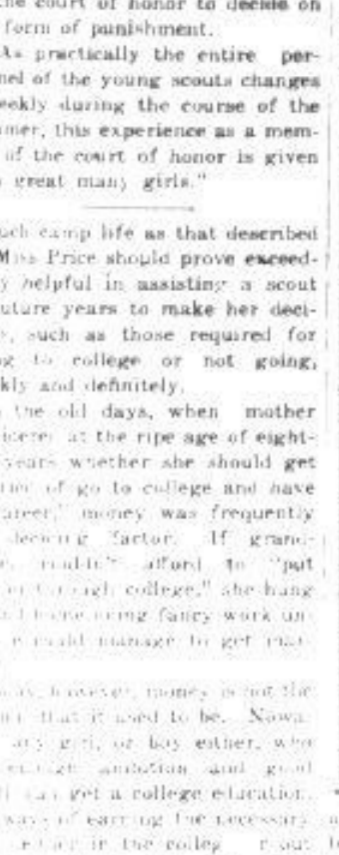

LOCAL MASONS TO ATTEND BIG EVENT

Will Go to Alexandria, Va., for Laying of Washington Memorial on Rockstone.
A number of Masons from this vicinity are planning on attending the ceremonies accompanying the laying of the cornerstone of the George Washington Masonic National Memorial at Alexandria, Va., on Thursday, November 1. The event will draw together the largest number of Masons ever attending any ceremony.
This memorial is an expression of the esteem in which the Masons of the United States hold Washington, the Mason. It will be the grandest memorial ever erected to any individual. The dimensions of the edifice are all to be 225 feet in depth by 100 feet in width, exclusive of steps, terraces and appendages. One of its big features will be an imposing atrium, 70 feet wide and 100 feet deep, which will form the Memorial Hall, in which a statue of George Washington will be set up. This hall will be 64 feet high. The monument will be 200 feet high. It will be located on Soldiers Hill, along the Potomac river, just outside Washington, D. C., of which it will command a view and from its height also Mount Vernon will be visible.
Alexandria was chosen for the site of this memorial because President Washington was the first Worshipful Master of the Masonic lodge in that city. This lodge has numerous priceless relics of the first president, including the Williams portrait, which is declared by experts to be the truest likeness in existence of the "Father of his country."
The cost of the memorial and the edifice will reach \$4,000,000, all of which the Masons of the United States are contributing. When the cornerstone is laid Nov. 1, the crowd used by General Washington when he laid the cornerstone of the national capital building in Washington, D. C., will be utilized. All railroads will give reduced fares to those who journey to Washington and Alexandria for the cornerstone laying event.
W. C. T. U. NOTES
"A Citizenship Creed", proposed by the American Bar Association for use during Constitution Week, Sept. 16-27.
The first paragraph pertains to the duty of informing oneself on our history and application of its principles to present problems; the second paragraph affirms the duty to help form public opinion and always to exercise the right of franchise. The last one is quoted in full: "It is my duty as a patriotic American citizen to be a 'silent man' of the Constitution, ready at all times to defend its established institutions of our government against attacks, either from within or without and to do my part in preserving the blessings of liberty for which our Revolutionary forefathers fought and died. I believe that I must maintain continually a civic consciousness and that my country needs my active service in times of peace no less than in war; that patriotism must be a constituent part of my religion; that no proslavery man can evade from my lips than truly to declare, 'I am an American citizen.'"
Franklin N. Whitney, president of the National Association of Men's Apparel Clubs after a long time in the middle west said recently to a representative of the press: "We realize that less than many means less clothing. 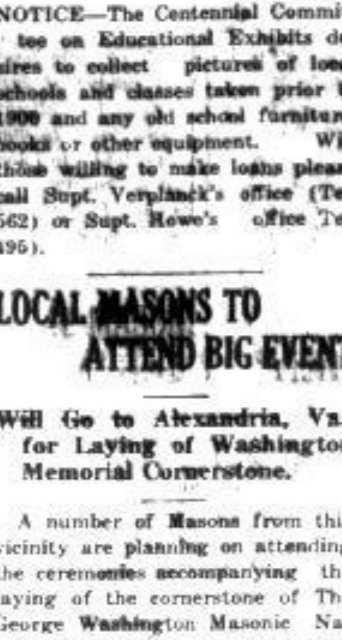

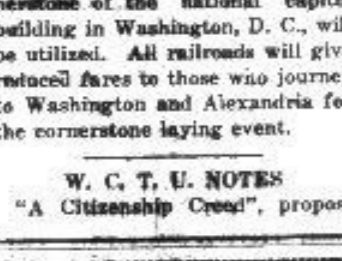
