

OKLAHOMA MILITIAMEN DRIVE LEGISLATORS OUT OF CAPITOL

54 Succeed in Passing "Ring of Steel" Without Bloodshed; Gather in House Chamber—Shuffle Out Again Without Transacting Any Business When Ordered by Colonel Key Who Was Backed with Browning Machine Guns and Troopers with Fixed Bayonets—Scene in Capitol Most Dramatic as "Lawless Mob" Is Told to "Move On."

State Capitol, Oklahoma City, Okla., Sept. 26.—The Oklahoma House of Representatives failed this noon in their attempt to assemble in defiance of Gov. J. C. (Iron Lark) Walton, when they tried to meet "under the constitution" as they said, they were dispersed by the military.

Speaker Foster Charles S. Baker of McAlester county, at exactly 12 o'clock, called the House of Representatives to assemble in the fourth floor chamber of the capitol on the fourth floor just adjacent to the legislative chamber of the house of representatives for determining whether a quorum was present. Colonel W. S. Key, military commander of Oklahoma City, immediately interrupted and requested the legislators to maintain order, read the military order directing that the legislators be dispersed.

He stated that it was his duty to disperse them and consequently pulled out with the military which they left the courtyard of dispersing quietly and in an orderly manner. "I have my orders from the Adjutant General who has received his instructions from the governor," said Col. Key. "I hope there will be no trouble, that you will do as I ask," he said sternly.

Two Legislators Came Early
The first two to arrive were Representative P. M. Boyer of Tulsa County and Representative Marshall Smith of Hoop County.

By virtue of being members of the House, they were vested with a pass-word. Then they came to the state during the present period of unrest on the ground that such a gathering or meeting is an unlawful assembly in violation of the provisions of the constitution and laws calculated to bring about a breach of the peace, provoke riot and instigate a reign of anarchy and bloodshed.

There was a dramatic passage of the military order, which was read by Representative David A. Stewart of Hope, who stood facing Colonel Key, and the next question was, "Are you in conference?"
