GERMAN FEDERAL TROOPS RUSHING INTO BAVARIA

Dictator Gessler in First Test of Strength With Bavarian Chief Von Kahr—Munich Authorities Refuse To Suppress Hitler's Official Organ—Tanks and Airplanes Rushed To Scene of Threatened Disorders.

Munich, Sept. 29.—Reinforcements of federal troops poured into Bavaria today to suppress disorder and to maintain the authority of Federal Dictator Gessler.

During the night 17 clatter of tanks could be heard in Munich as they rumbled through the streets to guard the barracks.

Searchlights swept the sky.

After daybreak airplanes began to drone over the city, drifting lazily back and forth watching for concentrations of fascists.

Troops are guarding the government buildings.

Test of strength.

Berlin, Sept. 29.—The first test of strength between the German state, as represented by National Dictator Otto Gessler, and Bavaria, as represented by Dictator Von Kahr, came today. Up to mid-afternoon there had been no decision.

The clash arose over an order from Gessler to suppress the Hitler official organ, Volkischer Beobachter, of Munich.

CLOUDBURSTS AND FLOODS TAKE HEAVY TOLL IN MIDWEST STATES

Omaha, Neb., Sept. 29.—Seventeen reported to have struck Oakkosh, a small Nebraska community.

Wrecking and sections of Iowa and Kansas are heaviest sufferers in the storm. Scores of bridges were swept away in Wyoming and long stretches of railroad track washed out.

All General Bluffs, 35 houses reported wrecked. Firemen were called out to rescue occupants. The full force of the storm descended on Broken Arrow, Okla., wrecking houses and blowing down trees. The city was placed in the path of the storm and was partially destroyed, crippling services.

New York, Sept. 29.—Declaring that a good horse will run well "any place any time," Basil Jaxby, trainer of Papyrus, prepared to move the colt away from the Aquitania to his quarters at Belmont Park, where it will race American leading three-year-olds on Oct. 26.

EXAMINATION OF VITAL ORGANS OF MRS. WEBB REVEAL POISONING

Traces of Bichloride of Mercury Discovered in Stomach of Rich New York Society Woman Whose Mysterious Death Hunts at Foul Play—Had Left Three Different Wills Disposing of \$2,000,000 Estate.

New York, Sept. 29.—Discovery of traces of bichloride of mercury poisoning in the stomach of Mrs. Gertrude German, 43, wealthy number of an old New York family, gave fresh impetus today to the official investigation that is under way to determine the exact cause of her death.

Mrs. Webb, worth more than \$2,000,000 in her own right, died at the fashionable Westchester-Biltmore Country Club Tuesday night under circumstances so suspicious that Dr. W. J. Mayer, her physician, refused to sign the death certificate and demanded an investigation. He was supported in his demand by several of Mrs. Webb's relatives, who asserted the diet of "salve poisoning."

While examination of the vital organs has revealed traces of bichloride, the analysis had not yet developed whether poison was the primary cause of death. It was stated today and it was upon this feature of the sensational case that the authorities are now concentrated.

Meanwhile, investigation also is being made into the private life of Mrs. Webb and it has been discovered that Mrs. Webb made three wills disposing of her \$2,000,000 estate. The first of these left the fortune to relatives and friends; the second, said to be a ten-line document, left it to her husband, Charles Webb, and the third, longer document, left undivided by her death, also disposed of the bulk of the estate to her husband. The second document is said to be valueless.

The Webb's were married less than a year ago following the death of Mrs. Webb's mother, Mrs. S. Jennings German, who had steadfastly opposed her marriage to the broker. At the time of her marriage Mrs. Webb was 23, and was active in the management of her New York realty holdings.

She had never been ill according to her friends and relatives. A month ago she began complaining of eye and kidney trouble, growing steadily worse until her death Tuesday night at the country club. Her mother's fatal illness is said to have had the same beginning.

OKLAHOMA SUPREME COURT IS DECIDING WALTON'S FUTURE

State Tribunal Will Make Decision Today on Petition to Allow Private Privilege of Voting on "Petition No. 79"—Would Permit Legislature To Convene Itself in Order To Impeach Governor—Walton Does Not Relish Test.

Oklahoma City, Okla., Sept. 29.—Whether the people of Oklahoma will be given an opportunity to vote at a special election next Tuesday on the issue of the hour, "Walton 79," will be decided by the State Supreme Court today.

The court was expected to decide whether the initiative "Petition No. 79," a bill permitting the legislature to convene itself for impeachment purposes, will be placed on the ballot along with five other proposed amendments to the constitution which will be voted upon in the October 2 election.

Gov. J. C. (Iron Jack) Walton's political future is wrapped up in how the people vote on "Petition No. 79," if it is placed on the ballot. The people, through a vote on the bill, would be given an opportunity to say whether they were in sympathy with "lawless" legislators who were dispersed from the state capital last Wednesday at the point of the bayonet, or with Gov. Walton, upon whose orders they were dispersed.

The governor declined to discuss a reported "takeup" in his official staff. He explained the takeup was a vacation. Col. Charles Barrett, formerly general manager of the Oklahoma National Guard, welcomed the question upon a vote of the people. They expressed confidence that the voters will vindicate their course and provide an incontrovertible way in which they can impeach Walton.

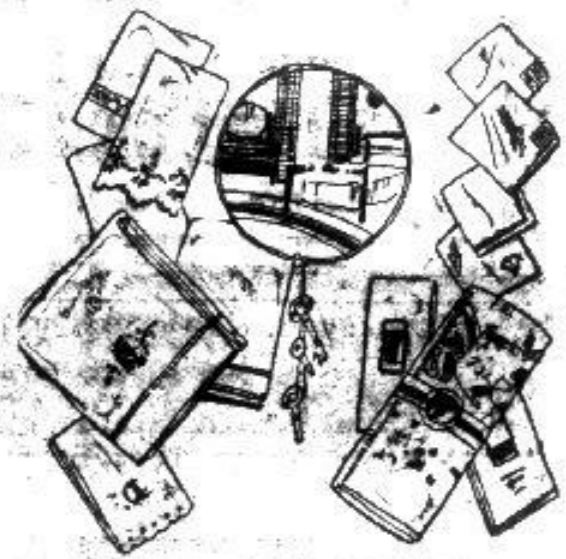

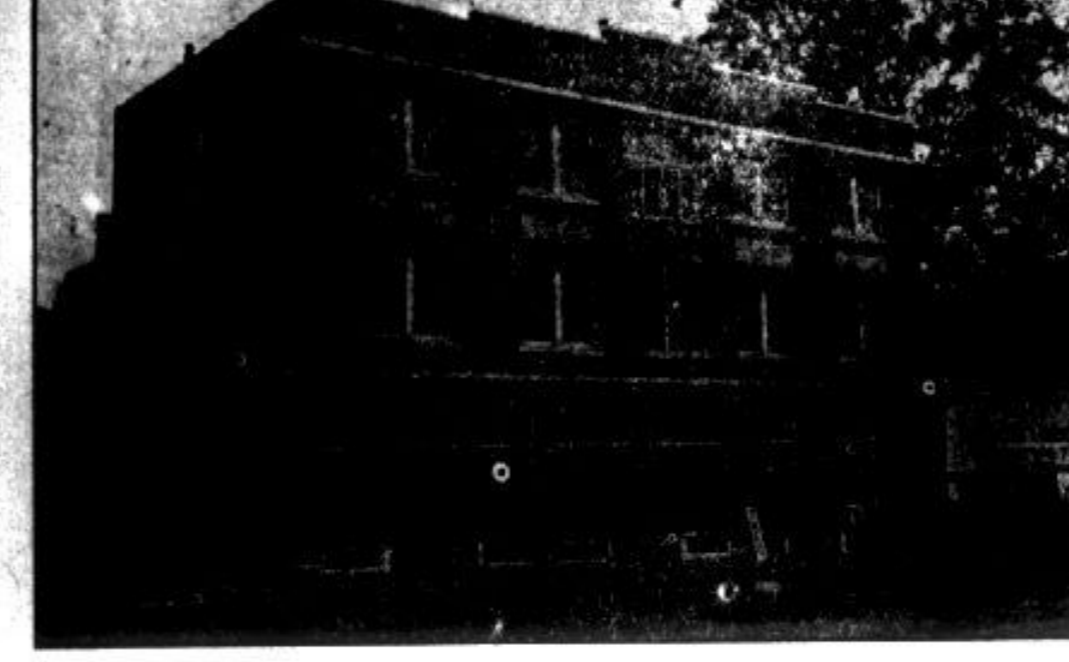
