## GERMAN FEDERAL TROOPS RUSHING INTO BAVARIA

Dictator Gessler in First Test of Strength With Bavarian Chief Von Kahr—Munich Authorities Refuse To Suppress Hitler's Official Organ—Tanks and Airplanes Rushed To Scene of Threatened Disorders.

Munich, Sept. 29.—Reinforcements of federal troops poured into Bavaria today to suppress disorder and to maintain the authority of Federal Dictator Gessler.

During the night the clatter of tanks could be heard in Munich as they rumbled through the streets to guard the barracks.

Searchlights swept the sky.

After daybreak airplanes began to drone over the city droning lazily back and forth watching for concentrations of Fascists.

Troops were guarding the government buildings.

Chief of State of Strength

Berlin, Sept. 29.—The first test of strength between the German and Bavarian states, as represented by National Dictator Otto Gessler and Bavaria, as represented by Dictator Von Kahr, came today. Up to mid-afternoon there had been no decision.
