# Violence Breaks Out in 2 Oklahoma Oil Towns

### Armed Deputies Sent to Force Mayors and Police Chiefs of Healdton and Wilson to Allow Opening of Voting Places—Elections Proceeding Quietly in Majority of Other Cities and Towns—Walton's Minute Men Dispersed Without Bloodshed by "Vigilantes"—Thousands Ready to Fight for Right of Suffrage.

Armore, Okla., Oct. 2.—Two forces of armed men specially deputized for today's election were rushed to Healdton and Wilson, nearly all towns today by Sheriff London, who had reports from citizens there that serious trouble was threatened.

Forty-five men were sent to Healdton 25 to Wilson. Outbreak of violence became threatening in Healdton when the mayor and chief of police refused to permit the election.

The armed deputies were sent to open the polls at Healdton, Sheriff London explained.

At Wilson, only a few polls were opened and Walton's Minute Men were said to be dominating the situation. Sheriff London's men will seek to disperse them.

Major O. A. Carroll, a scout in stature and fearless to the point of recklessness, and himself an ex-politician, headed an army of police service should the situation demand it, he said.

The situation in Armore is quiet with only light voting during the first few hours of the election.

Election booths were under erection of armed "vigilantes" when the polls were opened here.

An injunction restraining the military "Minute Men" and any one else interfering with the election was granted by the district court at the eleventh hour.

Start Voting at 6 A. M. Oklahoma City, Oct. 2.—The people of Oklahoma, forbidden to vote, marched to the polls today and cast their ballots.

Not a shot has been fired at an armed man in Oklahoma City as yet, but a half hour after the polls had opened, Captain D. J. Jones, of the police department, told International News.

The National Guardsmen, who Governor Walton had said would prevent the polling places from opening, were removed from duty at 10 o'clock this morning.

Unexpected Action. This unexpected action followed a warning from Mayor Carroll that the city would brook no interference from the military; that the civil police were equal to the occasion.

A few hours before, from midnight until 3 a. m., there had been unusual activity on the part of the military. Motor transports, containing scores of soldiers, in khaki appeared on the scene.

A sentence prevailed during that period that was not in evidence when the civil authorities and "vigilantes" later took charge of the situation.

Newspaper Men Halted. Newspaper men, traversing the streets on foot or in taxicabs, were repeatedly halted. This correspondent was stopped nine times after midnight in riding from the police office of the Oklahoma leader to the County Court house a distance of nine blocks. Each time the custodian demanded to see the special military pass given newspapermen and searched the car for firearms.

Lucid Reports. A report at one o'clock this morning that the military in motor transports had started for the county court house, for the purpose of entering the election houses, created a stir in newspaper offices and caused a rush of reporters to the scene.

Arriving in the darkness at the courthouse, the reporters, as their eyes drew up the roadway leading to the courthouse, found themselves confronted with the "vigilantes" who were operating independently of the planholders.
