Berlin, Oct. 4.—Dr. Gustav Noske, leader of the Socialists, has been unable to form a non-partisan cabinet to take the place of the old coalition government which recently collapsed. The Socialists have directly appealed to political leaders which had been precipitated by the break-down of the Workers' and Peasants' Party.

Herbert Hoover said not long ago that he knew of no greater need of the United States at this time than to help its young men with training which could fit them for positions in foreign commerce. Soon after this President Hoover appointed a commission to study the needs of the English and Delaware announced that eight of his undergraduates were sailing for France to learn the language, study at a French university, and fit themselves for business here.

Mr. Hoover said: "American business men may in time overcome the handicap of competing for world markets with rivals represented by agents equipped for the task."

"Our plan," said President Hull, "is aims to reach the type of men who is going into business; the type of men who are three-fourths of our college graduates of today."
