WALTON WARNS INVISIBLE POWER MUST END OR STATE WILL TOPPLE BRITISH LABORITES FEAR UNEMPLOYMENT MAY HURT ORGANIZED TRADE UNIONS

State Capitol, Oklahoma, Oct. 11 (con't). On August Fourteenth, I declared martial law in Tulsa County else the state of Oklahoma will be subjected to "indefinite turmoil and strife, the final results of which will pour into the executive office from Tulsa and other counties in the state complaints and charges to be discussed," Senator J. C. (Frank) Walton told the special session of the Oklahoma legislature when it assembled here today.

Business Challenge. He repeated his challenge to the invisible government that Oklahoma citizens have forever been from the hooded gathering which he blamed for many outrages, resulting in military law and virtual rebellion of civic authority a week ago.

Included Religious Hatred

"This invisible, insidious and terrorizing empire represents in an exaggerated way fear (alleged) and religious hatred."

The text of the governor's message follows:

"Gentlemen: October Sixth, 1925—We issued a proclamation convening the members of the Ninth Oklahoma legislature into extraordinary session and you are now here attending.

"The reason for calling you to this session is well known both to the members of this body and to the people at large. They grow out of the conflict in this state between visible and the invisible government and the people of the North.

"Some cases present outrages and acts of violence, and others rendering crisis in the government or Oklahoma will face indefinite turmoil and strife, the final results of which are bound to be disastrous."

No Threat

"This is not a threat, but a mere statement of facts."

"It ought to be apparent now to the citizens of the people of the state that we are compelled to meet every exigency, even if it means our extinction. It must either be killed or the government itself give way to aarchy and revolution. There is no alternative.

"The reason for bringing to a close with a complete victory for the visible government, or Oklahoma will face indefinite turmoil and strife, the final results of which are bound to be disastrous."

Must Terminate Such Conditions.

"That these conditions that have immediately terminated and that have been created by the people, are fundamental, diversity, freedom and equality that may be expected, for example, in their person, property and
