

GIANTS TAKE 3d GAME 1-0

Coolidge to Ask Governors Assistance in Adoption of Sweeping National Dry Law

Five Severe Recommendations to Be Placed Before White House Conference On October 20--Drug and Immigration Bootlegging Also to Receive Attention.

Washington, Oct. 12.—Adoption of a sweeping national code for the enforcement of the dry law is the chief suggestion which the Coolidge administration will advance at the Governors conference at the White House on October 20, it was learned here today.

This plan, worked out by the prohibition unit on the basis of questionnaires submitted to all state executives, details closest coordination of federal and state dry agencies in gathering up the loose ends and strengthening the weak spots in the nationwide enforcement system.

Chief recommendations for the formation of a code are: 1. That the "padlock system" be used extensively to close up establishments violating the prohibition law.

2. That state authorities assume a more vital and active part in conducting dry raids.

3. That prosecuting attorneys and courts deal more severely with liquor violators, imposing jail sentences as well as heavy fines.

4. That purchases of contraband wet goods be dealt with as severely as sales.

5. That more speed and preference be given liquor cases by the courts.

TOWN TO PURCHASE LAND ON ELDREDGE STREET FOR \$1,800

Five Foot Strip Taken From Eastern Construction Company in Building Line Argument—Parking Restrictions as Possible Matter of Litigation—Restrictions on Cottage St. and Around Old Fellows' Block Out Into Town By-Law sat Last Night's Meeting of Selectmen.

The five feet of land on Eldredge Street which Eastern Construction Company and the two new members, Selectmen R. J. Smith and Welles A. Strickland, were proposed in the effort to straighten out the building line on that street, have passed in the opinion of the selectmen.

Other chapters of the plan were completed last evening by the board of selectmen in buying a strip for \$1,800. This price is decidedly lower than the amount originally set, as it was thought that the owners would hold out for a price of \$4,000.

It will be remembered that when Eastern Construction Company first made plans to erect the building which now stands on the corner of Main and Eldridge streets, the building permit was held up on account of the fact that last year's board of selectmen were desirous of putting through a by-law which would give a number of streets, and highways and that the shoulders be not what they should be.
