CUT TAXES TO INCREASE RECEIPTS

Proposed.—A Motion of the House committee on appropriations proposes a revision of income taxes downward, all the way from the smallest taxable income to the largest.

Secretary Miller backed elimination of the excess profits tax and reduction of the surtax.

Experience has proved that the government would receive a greater total tax income from the revised tax.

The higher taxes drove capital into tax exempt securities.

As long as there is income taxes, there is no incentive productive capital into tax exempt securities it may not be removed.

At the same time this stimulation of the sale of tax exempt securities would be tax-payers burdened by increasing local and state taxes.

MONOPOLY OR COMPETITION?

It is a fundamental principle of socialist teachings that state monopoly in any line of service is to do away with competition.

As a general rule, government monopoly is only efficient when it meets the direct stimulus of competition with private enterprises.

Private charter compete with existing monopolies, but the latter are not always undertaken by private corporations that carry on successfully.

Socialistic propaganda continues努力 to teach that private enterprise is the factor of the public governmental monopoly.

Complete governmental monopoly brings stagnation to any country, for it kills the initiative and enter-

prise.
