CONVICTS SENT TO PRISON BY PLANE

Kansas Sets New Mark for Rapid Delivery of Men to Penitentiary.

Leavenworth, Kan., Oct. 29.—In an effort to keep pace with the increased population of the wheels of justice, Kansas authorities have expedited the way to a forty transportation of prisoners to the State Penitentiary.

The first experiment in this method of hauling the prisoners of law was made when Charles Connor, chief of the Leavenworth County, arrived at the penitentiary here at 5 o'clock in the afternoon with three persons who had been convicted in Wichita, 200 miles south, at 2:10 o'clock.
