

GERMAN CIVIL WARFARE CONTINUES TO SPREAD

From 20 to 35 Persons Killed in Fights—Rhenish Palatinate Favors Autonomy—10 Lynched at Aachen—Hamburg Spends Night of Terror.

There was a slight abatement of violence in Germany today although warfare still continued. From 20 to 35 persons were killed in disorders and fights. Hundreds were wounded.

The Reds, driven from Hamburg, entrenched themselves in the suburbs and stubbornly refused to give further battle.

Naval airplanes are protecting the Hamburg harbor and attacking the Aachen-Hamburg movement has developed in the Rhineland. Two separatists were beaten to death at Aachen (Aix La Chapelle) and the separatist mayor of Mueschen-Gladbach was murdered.

Information from official sources indicates that Bavaria is now the only German state not adhering to the Reich. All the rest have proclaimed loyalty.

Five hundred arrests have been made at Hamburg, where martial law was proclaimed.

Autonomy Favored

Berlin, Oct. 24.—The Rhenish Palatinate, the district lying between Baden and Rhenish Prussia, declared in favor of autonomy today. It is understood that the proclamation was not met and after the separatist leaders conferred with the French military authorities.

A dispatch from Aachen this afternoon said that the separatists in that district were gaining an upper hand over the Reich troops. The French are accused of furnishing arms to the separatists.

A Reichwehr unit composed of the famous fifteenth division of the famous fifteenth division of the Reich, was ordered to Wandsbeck, three miles from Hamburg, to be ready to aid the police in the event of any serious disorders.

Word was received from Hamburg shortly after noon that the Communists were establishing a line of trenches through the suburb of Schiffbeck. Up to that time the sailors landed at Hamburg from a warship had not been employed but were being held in readiness for escape.

Some Bavarians Still Loyal

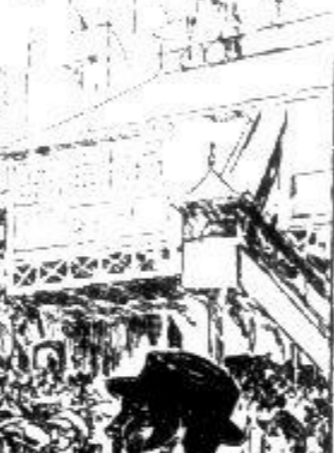
