

# BRITAIN STANDS OPPOSED TO SEPARATIST REPUBLIC

## London Prepares to Notify France Whether Set Up in Rhineland or Anywhere Else in Germany—Socialists Demand Ebert's Resignation

London, Oct. 31.—Great Britain is preparing to notify France as to whether it is prepared to recognize a separate republic in the Rhineland, it was learned at the foreign office today.

Great Britain has consistently held that it will not recognize any separate republic in the Rhineland until it is prepared to depart from this policy.

The British will not recognize any independent states set up in the Rhineland or elsewhere in Germany.

Ask Ebert's Resignation

Berlin, Oct. 31.—Socialist party leaders at a meeting here today demanded the resignation of President Ebert and the Socialist ministers in the Stresemann government.

The Socialists adopted a resolution protesting against the death sentence imposed upon a young Communist who took part in the rioting at Hamburg last week.

The three day general strike proclaimed by the Communists in Saxony in retaliation for repressive measures taken by the Berlin government has failed out. Dresden reported that the strike among the Ex-Crown Prince wants to come back.

It was learned authoritatively that the German ex-Crown Prince is making desperate efforts through emissaries to secure the German government's permission to return to his German estate to live as a private citizen. So far all his efforts have failed owing to the German government's fear that Wilhelm's return at this time might aggravate the internal situation, but the negotiations are continuing.

It is reported that he already has obtained consent of the British government to leave Holland.

(An Amsterdam dispatch by the International News news agency said it was officially denied that the former Crown Prince has sought and obtained permission to return to Germany.)

It is understood that the ex-Crown Prince is hopeful of success and has bought a high speed motor car.
