

Prohibition Forces to Ask \$20,000,000 From Congress in Coast Rum Running Fight

Cruiser Type of Coast Guard Cutters Sought to Pursue Sea-Going Liquor Boats—Coolidge Approves Move.

Washington, Nov. 8.—A Congress will be asked to appropriate \$20,000,000 to provide a powerful fleet of new revenue cutters and motor boats to chase rum smugglers, it was learned at the Treasury Department today.

The administration plan calls for more than 200 additional boats to be operated under the Coast Guard. The Coast Guard recommendation for new ships and additional personnel, are supplemental to regular estimates of \$14,000,000 for ordinary operations.

New rum boat owners, under the larger appropriations planned will include:

20 Sea-Going Cutters. Twenty additional sea-going revenue cutters, of the cruiser type, to serve as bases for large fleets of motorboats.

200 Small Motor Boats. Two hundred and three motor boats of the cabin cruiser type for use in shallow waters.

Mr. Spence, small motor boats for emergency use at Coast Guard stations.

With the approval of President Coolidge, officials supervising prohibition enforcement will ask Congress to finance the expansion of Coast Guard operations. The chasing of rum smugglers will become the major function of this branch of the service.

To Buy of Build New Boats. The government's plan will be to acquire the additional vessels as quickly as possible either by purchase or by new construction.

Under the Coast Guard's regular budget estimate of \$11,000,000, officials plan to put in service at sea an indefinite number of coast guard vessels from the existing fleet. New appropriations will be used to equalize many such craft tied up at different ports for repairs.

Congress will be asked by the administration to authorize use of seized rum boats of extraordinary swiftness which are now tied up in American ports, pending litigation and frequently are sold back to their former owners.

No Provision for Interior Work. The new plan for enlargement of rum boat chasers makes no provision for attacks from smugglers along the river boundaries of Mexico and Canada. Operations of this sort are left to the land forces of the prohibition unit.

This Coast Guard plan will be presented to Congress separately from the regular budget estimates of governmental expenditures which are transmitted early next month. The whole question of more vigorous enforcement and the checking of illicit liquors at their source will be put up to Congress for disposition.
