## Sixty-Eighth Congress Meets Today Amid Conditions Unique In Political History Of U. S.

### Torn With Factional Strife and Facing Presidential Year Legislative Program is Expected to Be Productive of Few Results.

Washington, Dec. 3.—The sixty-eighth congress convened here today thirteen months after its election amid conditions that are unique in the legislative and political history of the country.

Few congresses in the past have been confronted by a more momentous array of domestic problems. There has never been so torn with factional strife, and few have started the long session with less hope of constructive accomplishment.

Two obstacles stood out at the opening today as barriers to smooth running, workmanlike procedure: (1) the fact that Republicans and Democrats have a working majority in either house; and (2) the fact that the new session is going straight into a heated Presidential campaign now only few months away, with all factions striving for political advantage.

Both houses were called to order sharply at noon. There were few vacant seats on either side and the galleries were choked in capacity with scores of visiting congressmen and their families.

Prayer by the chaplain opened the proceedings in both houses. The senate chaplain, Rev. J. J. Muir, mentioned the sorrow of the anniversary of the death of the late President Harding during the interim and asked that divine consolation rest with the widow, and guidance be bestowed upon her successor in the White House.

The senate convened.

Senator La Follette was absent when the gavel fell. At his office, he was said to have recovered from the grippe that has kept him bedfast for a fortnight but he was in such condition his physicians advised against his appearing today.

Mrs. Coolidge, wife of the President, was in the President's executive box, and became the cynosure of all eyes as her presence was whispered around the crowded galleries.

The first seven of the new senators sworn in were Democrats and the fact that each was elected with a Republican vote is the most significant testimony of the sharp overturn that took place in election. It was eloquent too, of how close is the division of strength in the new senate.

The inauguration of the House headed by Representative Nelson, Republican of Wisconsin, and Representative Cavanaugh, Republican of New York, declared as the House got under way that "there would be no organization today."

Immediately following the roll call it was shown that 417 members were present out of 433, the eighth over the speaker's report. The following nominations were made:

FRONTIER: H. C. G. Republican of Mississippi.

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H. J. Allen Cooper, of Wisconsin, an enthusiastic outburst of applause greeted the nomination of Gilbert of Representative of Minnesota. Virtually all of the Republican representatives arose and applauded for fully three minutes.

Protracted cheering and applause broke out when Representative Henry T. Rainey, Democrat of Illinois, nominated Barrett for the speakership.

In nominating Cooper, Representative Charles Brown, Republican of Wisconsin, declared that "Cooper's selection for this high position of speaker of the House would mean a complete reformation of the rules of the House which in the past have done much to hamper and to impede the progress of the best interests of the people of the country."

Madison Withdraw, Republican of Maryland, was elected.

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## SENATOR ROBINSON OF ARKANSAS TO BE NEW DEMOCRATIC LEADER

### Will Succeed Underwood of Alabama Who Has Resigned—Keynote for Success is Hard Work Says New Minority Chief—Full List of Nominees For Senate Offices Prepared.

Washington, Dec. 3.—Senator Joseph T. Robinson, of Arkansas, today was unanimously elected Democratic leader of the Senate at a party caucus. Robinson succeeds Senator Oscar W. Underwood, of Alabama, who retired at the end of the last session.

Other officers elected were: Vice Chairman, Senator Gerry of Rhode Island; and Secretary, Senator King of Utah.

The Democrats also nominated a list of candidates for the various offices of the senate. They include Senator Key Pittman, of Nevada, for the nomination as President pro tem of the Senate; Edward H. Malley, of Washington, D. C., secretary of the Senate; and John B. Harlan of Monticello, N. Y., as permanent secretary.

Keynote is Hard Work

"The Democratic keynote for the new Congress will be hard work and action," said Secretary Robinson, after the caucus. "There was and will be absolute harmony in the Democratic ranks."

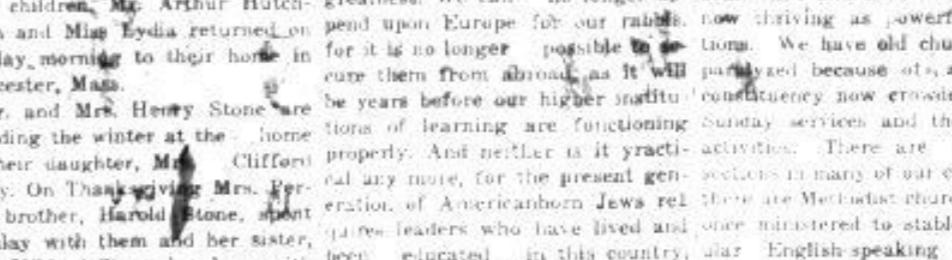
