G.O.P. INSURGENTS SWING BACK IN REGULAR RANK

Washington, Dec. 5.—After fighting like Kilkenny cats for two days, the Republicans of the 68th Congress buried their differences today and peacefully organized Congress for business.

Frederick H. Gillette, Republican of Massachusetts, was re-elected speaker of the house on the first ballot taken.

The little band of Northwestern insurgents who for two days held the House in deadlock and stopped all Congressional business having won their fight to liberalize the rules, handed down their colors this afternoon and joined with their Republican brethren of more conservative stripe in putting Gillette over within an hour after the house met.

A feature of the last 48 hours of the campaign was the growth in violence and rowdiness in various quarters. Candidates were threatened or attacked. A heavy vote, especially by the women, is expected.

Although the result cannot be definitely forecast, it is believed in many quarters that the Tories will have a slight majority in the House of Commons. Liberal and Labor leaders claim that the Tories will not be strong enough to put through Premier Baldwin's tariff proposition program.

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COOLIDGE IS TO BE CANDIDATE IN 1924 PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION

Washington, Dec. 5.—President Coolidge is to be a candidate for the presidency in 1924, and what will amount to a virtual dedication to this effect will be forthcoming from the White House sometime in the near future.

The President, it was said, plans to acknowledge the action of the South Dakota special convention which yesterday nominated him for the presidency and his acknowledgment will be so framed as to constitute an avowal of his nomination in South Dakota, which years ago started him on his way to the Vice Presidency.

Tangled Situation Faces G. O. P. In South Dakota Primary Results

Pierre, S. D., Dec. 5.—A tangled situation, with a candidate of one party facing a platform written by those who opposed him, confronted South Dakota Republicans today following the action of their state primary convention in nominating President Coolidge as the Republican presidential candidate and adopting the platform framed by supporters of Senator Hiram Johnson.

By the state law, the candidate selected first file in writing with the Secretary of state a signed declaration of his willingness to qualify, if nominated, and elected to the office.

U. of P. Freshman Commits Suicide After Jilting

"I am sorry for you, but we must part forever," were the words of the message, which police believed led the 19-year-old student to take his life. It was signed "Mary" and was dispatched from Mount Vernon, N. Y., where "Mary" attended school.

U. S. MUST DROP ISOLATION AND ENTER NATIONS LEAGUE

Noted Economist Speaks Before Annual Banquet of Manchester League of Women Voters—Says Failure in Past Has Destroyed European Markets—Calls Court No Alternative But Small Part of League—Answers Objections Raised During Last Campaign—Calls Attention to Ireland's Entrance—Civilization Sits in Volcano's Brink Because America Fails in Duty He Claims.

Noted economist Irving L. Fisher, of Yale University, one of the staunchest advocates of the proposition which was turned down by a four million majority at the last presidential election, told the Manchester League of Women Voters at their annual banquet in Cheney Hall last evening, that the present isolationist policy of the United States cannot last because the European markets are being lost and that the League of Nations is the only way to prevent competitive armaments and to prevent a recurrence of world wars. He cited the super-natural cause of the war and the League and answered their questions in detail. He pointed especially to the entrance of Ireland into the League of Nations as a sufficient answer to the objection that the League was anti-Irish.
