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WHITE HOUSE SANCTIONS AMERICAN PARTICIPATION IN COMMISSION TO SOLVE ALL REPARATIONS PROBLEMS

Official Announcement Made This Afternoon of Government's Willingness to Co-Operate With French and British—Delegates Will Have No Official Status But Will Take With Approval of U. S.

Washington, Dec. 11.—American experts will co-operate with the economic authorities of other countries, notably France and Britain, in an effort to find a solution for the reparations problem. Official announcement was made at the White House this afternoon that the government has given its sanction to American sitting with the French and British.

No Official Status
The Americans who will participate in the undertaking will do so under auspices of the Allied Reparations Commission, but they will not be official representatives of the United States. They will take part as private citizens, with the approval of their government. Scope To Be Made—Paris, Dec. 11.—Louis-Philippe, chairman of the international reparations commission, has assured Colonel J. A. Logan, the American representative, that the scope of the proposed inquiry into Germany's capacity for indemnity payments, by an international commission of experts, would be wider than previously believed. It was learned by International News today.

French political circles are optimistic that America will eventually decide to participate. U. S. To Press for French Debt.—Washington, Dec. 11.—The United States will continue to exert efforts in every practical manner to procure the payment of the \$4,000,000,000 French war debt, secretary of the treasury Mellon declared today in a letter to Senator Borah, Republican of Idaho.

Mellon said, however, that the French government had made no proposal for freezing these dollars since August 1922, but that ultimate payment of the debt was fully assured.

SOVIET RUSSIA JOINS IN RACE FOR AIR SUPREMACY IN EUROPE

London, Dec. 11.—Soviet Russia has joined the race for air supremacy in Europe. Leon Trotsky, commissar for war in the Soviet government, is already building up a powerful air force, and at the same time, is giving creation of a naval 'airship' navy at the earliest possible moment, according to the press's dispatching here from Moscow today.

Trotsky Urges Creation of "Fighting Navy" to Supplement Aviation Plans—500 Fokker Planes With American-Made Wings Ordered by Moscow—German Experts Direct Building of Machines.

Paris, Dec. 11.—Soviet Russia's navy will consist basically of those of France and Italy. France is now the leading air power and it will not be long until Italy is seen and with Great Britain lead.

2,165 Deaths This Year
Reports from coroners, police and health departments of 22 of the principal cities throughout the United States compiled by International News Service show that 2,165 deaths were caused by "poison" during the past year.
