

WHITE HOUSE SANCTIONS AMERICAN PARTICIPATION IN COMMISSION TO SOLVE ALL REPARATIONS PROBLEMS

Official Announcement Made This Afternoon of Government's Willingness to Co-Operate With French and British—Delegates Will Have No Official Status But Will Take With Approval of U. S.

Washington, Dec. 11.—American experts will co-operate with the economic authorities of other countries, notably France and Britain, in an effort to find a solution for the reparations problem.

Official announcement was made at the White House this afternoon that the government has given its sanction to American sitting with the French and British.

No Official Status

The Americans who will participate in the undertaking will do so under the auspices of the Allied Reparations Commission, but they will not be official representatives of the United States. They will take part as private citizens, with the approval of their government.

Scope To Be Made

Paris, Dec. 11.—Louis Loucheur, chairman of the international reparations commission, has assured Colonel J. A. Logan, the American representative, that the scope of the proposed inquiry into Germany's capacity for indemnity payments, by an international commission of experts, would be wider than previously believed. It was learned by International News today.

Mr. Logan and Loucheur conferred frequently during the past fortnight. It was during the course of these conversations that the Reparations Commission chairman, a Frenchman, informed the American representative that the proposed committee would have greater powers than had been anticipated.

German Representatives Opposed

However, France is still opposing German or neutral representatives upon the proposed committee. The French plan calls for representatives from America, England, Belgium, Italy, France and possibly Japan.

The suggestions regarding the reparations investigation have been conducted entirely between Logan and Loucheur, and between Washington and the Paris government.

French political circles are optimistic that America will eventually decide to participate.

U. S. To Press for French Debt

Washington, Dec. 11.—The United States will continue to exert efforts in every practical manner to procure the payment of the \$4,000,000,000 French war debt, secretary of the treasury Mellon declared today in a letter to Senator Borah, Republican of Idaho.

Mellon said, however, that the French government had made no proposal for freezing these debts since August 1922, but that ultimate payment of the debt was fully assured.

LIGHTED CROSSES TO SHINE FOR HARDING

WOMAN 52, SUES LAWYER AGE 67, FOR HEART BALM

Pressure was brought upon him by powerful Tory leaders to stick to his post to prevent a possible labor government from coming into power.

Mexican Troops Restoring Order in Oil Regions

Mexico City, Dec. 11.—Federal troops held Ciudad Victoria, Tampico and Tuxpan and order is being restored in the Tampico oil field.

The destroyers, which left this evening are the Peary, Pope, Pillsbury, W. H. Preston, Sincere and Nevada.

The destroyers will rendezvous with the Chinese customs collection, although they were being used by the Chinese officials to create difficulties in Canton. If collections in the port of China are insufficient to meet foreign obligations, Dr. Sun Yat Sen promises to make it the pretext.

New York, Dec. 11.—Christmas the season of proverbial cheer holds certain promise of death for hundreds throughout the United States.

Death lurks in the Yuletide bowl, filled with "imported" liquors, synthetic gins, etherized beer, plain old moonshine and the dozens of varieties of homebrews and deadly products of the amateur and conscienceless distillers of "poison."

2,165 Deaths This Year

Reports from coroners, police and health departments of 22 of the principal cities throughout the United States compiled by International News Service show that 2,165 lives have been "taken" in 1923.

If this figure is applicable to the entire United States it means that the total number of lives lost to alcohol in 1923 will be about 10,000.

Two big premiums for the bootlegger—Christmas and New Year's—are just about all the money and ambulance men will have to take care of the victims of the "rush."

The 2,165 deaths reported to International News Service were declared to be conservative estimates and in many instances official figures.

He added:

"My illness came at a most unfavorable time. I believed my recovery would be almost immediate, but it has lasted longer than the doctors expected."

Trotzky urged "democracy" with the Communist party.

FOOD PRICES INCREASE FROM 2 TO 8 PERCENT

Washington, Dec. 11.—Retail food prices increased generally throughout the United States during the year ending Nov. 15, the Department of Labor announced today.

The increase ranged from eight percent in Chicago to two percent in Atlanta, Dallas, Norfolk and Richmond.

In Bridgeport, Conn., Manchester, N. H., Memphis, Milwaukee and New Haven the increase amounted to six percent. While in Cleveland, Indianapolis, St. Louis, St. Paul and Scranton, it was five percent.

The increase amounted to four percent in Baltimore, Hartford, St. C. Detroit, Jacksonville, Kansas City, Louisville, New York, Providence and Rochester, and to three percent in Boston, Portland, Me., St. Paul and Savannah.

During the month ending November 15, the largest increase was reported by Rochester, N. Y., amounting to three percent while Indianapolis, Jacksonville and Peoria reported an increase of more than five tenths of one percent. Six cities reported decreases, amounting to three percent in Detroit, one percent in Atlanta, and less than five tenths of one percent in Baltimore, Charleston, Norfolk and Savannah.
