President's Campaign For Re-Election to Be Started in That City December 27—Butler of Massachusetts Named As Generalissimo—Good, of Iowa, to Be Chief Lieutenant

Washington, Dec. 14.—President Coolidge's campaign to succeed himself in the White House in 1924 definitely got under way today. Official announcement was made that national headquarters of the Coolidge re-election campaign will be located at Chicago on Dec. 27, under the management of William M. Butler, of Massachusetts, one of his close personal friends and chief advisers, and that associated with Butler there will be James W. Good, ex-member of Congress from Iowa.

Coolidge Headquarters
Are Held for Christmas

(Continued from Page One)
Considered Strategic Location
It was decided to locate the headquarters of the Coolidge movement at Chicago, instead of at Cleveland, where the National Convention will be held next June, in order to compensate the former city, in part at least, for talking the convention away from its old stand of 20 years. The choice of Cleveland as a convention city was felt that some compensatory action was due Chicago.

The choice of Chicago, it was pointed out, has another advantage from a political standpoint in that it will tend to divorce the Coolidge movement from the east.
Good in Western
Selection of James W. Good as manager with Butler also is designed to destroy the illusion of Coolidge as "an Eastern candidate." Good represented an Iowa district in Congress for 14 years rising in that time to the powerful chairmanship of the Committee on Appropriations. When he retired last year of his own volition he was one of that select little coterie known as the Republican leaders of the House. He has a wide acquaintance throughout not only his own state of Iowa but the grain belt.

Butler is Big Chief
Under the plans that have been mapped out by the President's advisers, Butler is to be generalissimo of the entire Coolidge movement with a rising commission that will carry him from coast to coast and from Canada to the Gulf and Goo is to be his chief lieutenant.
No Sectional Managers Contemplated
No sectional headquarters or sectional managers are to be designated, Butler said today, at least there will be none formally designated at such.

In the main, however, it is understood Butler will spend a good deal of his time in the East. Good will take care of the midwest, James R. Reynolds, the south, etc. This leaves out the Pacific Coast but this would be taken care of in the time, it was said. Frank M. Searns, another Massachusetts friend of the President's also will spend his time in the East. State managers will be designated from time to time.
Next Formal Step in the Coolidge Campaign Will Be Forming in a Few Days
It will be in the form of a letter from the President to ex-Governor Eliot of South Dakota, who sponsored him in the recent proposal convention at Pierre.
