## COOLIDGE OFFICIALLY ENTERS SOUTH DAKOTA PRIMARY LISTS

White House Makes Announcement This Morning That President Will Be Republican Candidate For Re-Election on Western Ticket Next Spring—Writes Acceptance To Party Leaders.

Washington, Dec. 15.—Official announcement was made at the White House today that President Coolidge would be a candidate for the Republican presidential nomination in the South Dakota primary next spring.

President writes acceptance to party leaders. The president wrote a letter to Sam Elrod, former governor of South Dakota and his chief supporter in the recent Republican convention authorizing him to enter his name in the primary ballots in that state.

## 3 MEN KILLED 7 WOUNDED IN ALL NIGHT FIGHT

Drew, Miss., Dec. 15.—Three men are dead today, one dying and six others wounded and still under treatment, following a pitched battle which raged throughout most of the night between a posse of seven (local business) men and a gang of a dozen hoodlums near here.

Only after an hour's siege with a machine gun was the gang wounded seriously enough to effect their capture. The hoodlums were then brought into Drew, placed on the street, and hundreds of persons stood around watching and waiting for the fight.
