## DAWES AND YOUNG NAMED AS DELEGATES ON COMMITTEE TO PROBE GERMANY'S FINANCES

**Announcements Made by Inter-Affiliated Reparations Body**  
Today—Director of Budget and General Electric  
Company Official Considered Above All Other Americans—Start Work Next Month

Paris, Dec. 21.—Charles G. Dawes, Chicago banker and first director of the United States budget, today was designated President of the first committee of the inter-affiliated reparations body for reparations payments. The nomination was made by the International Reparations Commission under whose sponsorship the inquiry will be conducted.

The commission also officially approved the nomination of Owen D. Young, of New York, as chairman of the second investigating committee. Young is chairman of the board of directors of the General Electric Company, of Schenectady.

U. S. Appointed  
Appointee of Dawes was re-garded as a signal honor to the United States. Also, it puts the American representative in the same during the course of the investigation.

The reparations commission decided to refer Germany's request for a loan to the various allied governments.

Recommendation was made that the governments involved in the reparations negotiations "form a committee" to investigate Germany's financial situation.
