DAWES AND YOUNG NAMED AS DELEGATES ON COMMITTEE TO PROBE GERMANY'S FINANCES

Announcements Made by Inter-Ally Reparations Body Today—Director of Budget and General Electric Company Official Considered Above All Other Americans—Start Work Next Month.

Paris, Dec. 21.—Charles G. Dawes, Chicago banker, and first director of the United States loan get today was designated as one of the first committee to investigate Germany's capacity for reparations payments. The committee will be headed by the late Senator Owen D. Young, of New York, and another member of the investigating committee, Young is chairman of the board of directors of the General Electric Company, of Schenectady.

U. S. is Honored

Appointment of Dawes was regarded as a signal honor to the United States. It puts the Americans in a position of importance during the course of the investigation.

The reparations commission decided to refer Germany's request for a loan to the various allied governments.

Recommended that the government advise the reparations commission to investigate Germany's food situation.

St. John Brothers, British member of the investigating committee, has nominated L. M. Brainerd, member of the investigating committee and it was expected that these nominations would be confirmed without delay.

Start

Even if the committee are organized before Christmas it is anticipated that the committee will not be able to get down to work until the middle of January.

The French are particularly anxious to ascertain the amount of German wealth held in foreign countries. It is claimed that the German properties in America alone are worth hundreds of millions of dollars. France claims that Germany holds much wealth in other foreign countries, notably Great Britain, Scandinavia, Switzerland and Holland.

Secretary of State

The German government, in its request for a loan, cited Article 231 of the Versailles treaty. The committee, in notifying Germany that the request had been referred to the various governments, cited Article 231.

Today's action of the Commission lasted an hour and 45 minutes.

Article 231 says:

"Subject to such exceptions as the Reparations Commission may approve, a first charge upon all the assets and revenues of Germany, England and its constituent states shall be the cost of reparations on all other debts arising under the present treaty or any treaties or agreements supplementary thereto to or under arrangements concluded between Germany and the allied and associated powers during the armistice or its extension. Up to May 21, 1921, the German government shall not export or dispose of gold or other valuables without the approval of the allied and associated powers acting through the reparations commission."

Priority Charge

The priority of the charge established by Article 231 shall not be subject to the qualifications made by Article 231.

(A) The cost of the armistice or occupation as defined under Article 231 during the armistice and its extension.

(B) The cost of any articles of occupation as defined under Article 231 during the armistice and its extension.

(C) The cost of reparations arising out of the present treaty or any treaties or agreements supplementary thereto.

(D) The cost of all other obligations incumbent on Germany under the Armistice or occupation or under the present treaty or any treaties or agreements supplementary thereto.

The payment for such supplies and new materials for the army and navy shall be a first charge upon the assets and revenues of Germany to the extent and up to the amount which the allied and associated powers may determine by the reparations commission.

Guarantee Committee Start at Once

The "guarantee committee" will start to begin its investigation immediately. The inquiry probably will last about a month when a final report will be made to the reparations commission.

The reparations commission will consider the report of the League of Nations proposed for a loan to Germany to re-organize the finances of that country.

There is much speculation over the identity of the third American who is yet to be selected.

Want Venizelos To Return to Manage Affairs of Greece

Athens, Greece, Dec. 21.—Premier Constantinos declares today that all indications point to the return of Venizelos to Greece. Venizelos is expected to assume leadership of the government.

The Republicans are opposing Venizelos' return, fearing he would restore to the throne the monarchist element of the Republican government.

The army and navy officers who signed a protest demanding the withdrawal of King George, returned to Greece, have signed a request that Constantinos should of the Greek revolutionary committee. Constantinos is expected to return to Greece in the next few days.

NITRATE DESERT
AIDS WORLD

Resolute Region in Plateau Country of Chile is Source of Famous Soda Commodities

In the high plateau country of Chile, between the coast ranges and the Andes, lies a desert which is one of the driest spots on earth. No green thing grows upon it, no living creature is native to it. And yet this desert has been for centuries a primary support of human life in the civilized world, since the Nation's Potatoes, all through the centuries, were produced in this desert and its product. It is the only source of the raw material for the manufacture of the soda which the human race has been unable to produce in any other way. The people of the United States are still largely dependent upon it.

The cup is awarded as a capital prize to some winner of the New England show, each show to be given the honor of presenting the cup. It has been agreed that individuals
