## MEXICAN REBELS SEND MISSION TO WASHINGTON

### De La Huerta Followers Flushed With Success to Seek Recognition From U. S. — Oregon Forces Again Defeated — Revolutionary to Rev Offensive on Big Scale

Veracruz, Mex., Dec. 29. — A revolutionary commission appointed by Adolph De La Huerta, leader of the Mexican revolt, is enroute to Washington to present to the cause of the rebels, it was announced today.

The commission headed by Juan Lopez called yesterday for New Orleans on the steamship Nigra and Virginia. It will proceed to Washington immediately upon arrival at New Orleans.

Revolutionary headquarters here announced two important victories over the Patenas and declared that General Guadalupe Sanchez, rebel generalissimo, is "so encouraged over the situation" that he has ordered an immediate offensive on the Tampico and Oriental fronts.

Oregon Forces Defeated  
Chicago faces a severe defeat in an attempt to recapture Puebla, according to revolutionary headquarters. General Alor commanded the Huasteca forces.

Capture of a provision train at Laguna, a small town between San Luis Potosi and Saltillo is also claimed by the rebels who say officials of the train and the Federal guard were also taken prisoner.

General Alor has "deserted" proclamation against private persons possessing arms or ammunition in the "occupied areas" thus minimizing the danger of capture of the arms by soldiers.

Revolutionary leaders also report the defeat of the Federalists in an attempt to recapture Manzanilla under protection of cruisers. They met complete defeat at the hands of General Estrada, it is claimed.

Washington, D. C., December 29. — State Department officials refused to comment on the dispatches from Mexico today stating that Adolfo De La Huerta was sending a mission to Washington to place before the United States government the aims and plans of the revolutionary party.

Just before the present disturbance broke out south of the Grande the United States government was ready to send an ambassador to Mexico City "following the recognition extended to the three year government two months ago. However the matter still remains in status quo pending further developments.

Contrary reports continue to come in regarding the respective successes of the Federal and Revolutionary troops. While all cables from Mexico City are censured they continue to bring reports that President Oregon is confident of crushing the rebellion within a fortnight. On the other hand, cables from Vera Cruz bring news of rebel victories and promises to start a huge offensive on all fronts.

## SECRET SERVICE IS READY TO ARREST COUNTERFEITING BAND

Chicago, Dec. 29.—Important arrests which will clear up a counterfeiting plot held responsible for the plating of between 5,000,000 and a million in spurious \$10 Federal Reserve Bank notes, were expected today by a packed squad of federal Secret Service men in Chicago.

The notes have been scattered between the Eastern seaboard and the Rocky Mountain. Five arrests already have been made, including Secret Service operatives from Washington two here and one each in St. Paul, St. Louis and Peoria, though the names of two of the alleged conspirators have been made public.

The names of fourteen of the note distributors have been named. The five under arrest include one Mrs. May Sweeney, who was arrested last night, Dec. 21, during a terrific raid on a counterfeiters' hideout in the city.

## RUHR OCCUPATION COSTS ITALY MONEY; MUSSOLINI POLICY SHIFT COMMEMDED

Rome, Dec. 29.—Italy's budget deficit has been increased this year by nearly a billion lire because of the occupation of the Ruhr.

Naturally, the change of front by Mussolini with regard to the Ruhr appeals to popular feeling in Italy, and was to be expected.

The fact is though few open criticisms were heard practically no one in Italy approved of the support given by the Premier to the policy of Poincare. The only exception (and a bad one) for which support would have been the need to protect Italy's interest in the raw material supply instead of which while Italy had received quite regular support from Germany up to the time of the march into the Ruhr, arrivals have been reduced to 25 per cent since that date. So that Italy, according to statements by the Finance Minister, is practically losing all the value of coal which in previous years she was getting from Germany free of payment and which was the only amount for reparation in the Ruhr.

As a result of the Ruhr occupation the Italian deficit this year will be increased by nearly a billion lire.

## Abandon Hope Of Finding Any Of Dixmude Survivors

Paris, Dec. 29.—French, Italian and British destroyers and cruisers continued their search of the Mediterranean Sea today without finding any trace of the last French dirigible Dixmude or bodies of any of the missing 49 persons who were on board.

It is generally believed that the dirigible lies at the bottom of the sea somewhere off the coast of Sicily.

Uninhabited islands in the Mediterranean and deserted coasts of Tunis, Algeria, Tripoli and Sicily are being systematically searched by the crew of the Dixmude.

Belief was expressed in some quarters that the crew of the Dixmude may have landed and established a base in the mountains of the Alps, but this theory is not entertained in official quarters.

Officials of the Ministry of Marine are convinced that the dirigible was lost off the coast of Sicily, but her great weight, sank. However, the fact that no more bodies were found off the Sicilian coast after the corps of Lieut. Commander Duplais de Grenadon was picked up yesterday by Italian fishermen, has deepened this dramatic mystery of the air.

## JAPANESE REGENT ACCEPTS RESIGNATION OF CABINET

Yamamoto Ministry's Day Numbered Because of Assassination Attempt on Hirohito—Official Life Was of Short Duration — Came Into Being During Earthquake Days

Tokyo, Dec. 29.—The Yamamoto cabinet passed into history today. Prince Regent Hirohito accepted the resignation of its members which had been placed in his hands a few hours after an unsuccessful attempt had been made upon his life by a young college boy.

Was Known as "Reconstruction Cabinet"

The Yamamoto cabinet came into being during the earthquake days and was known as the reconstruction cabinet. Its days were numbered because of opposition from the powerful Seiyukai party but efforts were being made to keep it in power until after the marriage of the Prince Regent next month.

Assassination Attempt Harried Downfall

These efforts probably would have been successful had not the attempt upon the Prince Regent's life. Viscount Goto, minister of home affairs, assuming responsibility, was ordered to prevent the attempt, immediately resigned and later was dismissed from office. The resignation of Goto was a mark of humiliation.

Assassination by the request was delayed pending advice from the Elder Statesman among whom there was some division of opinion.
