ISLANDERS SAY GOVERNOR GENERAL SET HIMSELF UP AS AUTOCRAT—ABUSE OF VETO POWERS IS CHARGED—HARDING'S PROMISES SET AS NAUGHT BY AMERICAN'S ROLE IN CLAIM-CONGRESS TO PROBE MESS.

Washington, Jan. 9.—For the first time since the fight for Philippine Independence began, specific charges of bad administration were lodged with Congress yesterday.

Major General Leonard Wood was cited by the Philippine Independence Mission.

In a lengthy statement signed by Manuel Roxas, speaker of the Philippine House of Representatives, and Pedro Guevarra and Isuro Gaballon, resident commissioners, eight specific charges were made against the administration of General Wood.

General Wood, the statement declared, is injecting "the autocratic of an irresponsible executive into a representative democracy."
