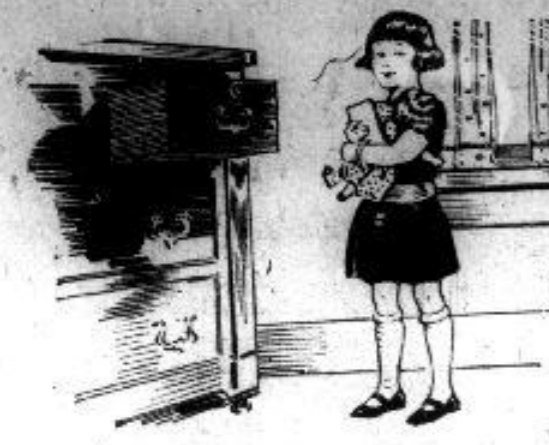

SCIENCE VIEWS YEAR OF GREAT STRIDES AHEAD

Nineteen Twenty Four May Be Greatest in History, Says Professor—Atom Yielding Secrets.

London, Jan. 10.—Although the year 1923 has been rich in medical, scientific and exploration discoveries, 1924, from all the signs, will be even richer.

Nineteen twenty-three saw the epoch-making discovery of insulin by Dr. Banting, the triple connection of Einstein's theory of relativity by an American astronomer, vertical helicopter flight of fifteen seconds' duration achieved by the English aviator, Ernest Everett, and the distance wireless telephony perfected by the American and English, the discovery of two-million-year-old dinosaur's eggs by an exploration party in the Gobi Desert, the bringing to light of further remarkable treasures from the tomb of Tutank-Amen by Howard Carter, and numerous other smaller but no less important inventions and discoveries. Certainly no year of this century has been richer.

Working Quietly

All over England alone, it is stated by eminent men, a vast amount of quiet research is progressing in the hope of giving something new to the world in 1924.

Sir William Bragg, famous scientist and one of the leading workers in the search after the mystery of the atom, states that he is still pursuing his researches and that from all the signs 1924 will see most of his discoveries made.

Fresh discoveries have been made by Dr. Banting and Professor Oliver on their respective theories of diabetes and relativity while Sir Elmer Lodge, famous scientist, states that he is working on his new theory of stellar physics in the search after the mystery of the atom, which he believes may be generated from light.

Marconi Bessy, famous wireless inventor, is stated to be at present engaged with wireless work. He is trying to develop the system of sending signals along a wireless beam so as to avoid broadcasting to the whole world.

Such a system, if perfected, will not only limit signals to a given direction, but will either greatly increase the range or enable the power used to be reduced, making wireless telephony over long distances a practical proposition.

From this it can be seen that it is within the bounds of possibility that some time during 1924 New York will be able to ring up London on given wave lengths by wireless telephony.

Another promised development is the use of the wireless beam for signalling to ships, and the improvement of the loud speaking device.

Marine Approaches

The marine event of 1924 will undoubtedly be the approach of the planet Mars to the earth. The Red Planet being nearer the earth on August 22, 1923, than it has been for 150 years. Astronomers all over the civilized world will no doubt endeavor to pierce the age-old mystery of the planet Mars by discovering its secrets.

General Druce and his colleagues are going to have another attempt at conquering the roof of the world—the Mount Everest, and there is every likelihood of their succeeding.

These are some of the principal events occurring or expected in 1924, but there are a veritable host of smaller happenings expected and conditions to be attempted, perhaps the most notable of which is the forthcoming American attempt to fly across the Arctic.

LETTER FROM GERMANY

COVERED WITH STAMPS

Cedar Rapids, Ia., Jan. 10.—It required stamps to the amount of 6,925,500,000 marks for the postage on a registered letter that was sent from Volkach, Germany, to a manufacturing company in America.

The letter is covered on both sides with stamps, leaving hardly enough room for the address. The stamps range in value from 1,000,000 to 500,000,000 marks each and before the letter was presented by the postage was \$1,731,275,000 according to figures by officials of a bank where the letter is being displayed.

UNFILLED STEEL TONNAGE

New York, Jan. 10.—The United States Steel corporation today reported unfilled tonnage on its books as of December 31st last, of 4,446,500 tons against 4,368,584 tons November 30, last an increase of 77,915 tons.

GREEK REPUBLICANS ACTIVE

Athens, Jan. 10.—M. Roussos, who was designated to form a new Greek cabinet met with a number of states today with a view of opposition from the Republican extremists.

It was understood that if M. Roussos did not succeed in forming a cabinet that will endure, the task will be turned over to General Daniglis.

BUTLER'S CRUSADE STRIKES FIRST SNAG

Philadelphia, Pa., Jan. 10.—Brigadier General Stanley D. Butler's crusade "war on vice and crime" in Philadelphia, crashes head on into his first political opposition today.

Magistrate Edward P. Carney, political "buddy" of Mayor W. Fredman Kendrick, General Butler's sponsor, opposed jail for the first of those arrested by General Butler's raiders.

"If this goes up on the square in Butler's goal and hatter down the doors of Philadelphia's exclusive clubs; let him send his men into the cellars of the rich, instead of the hovels of the poor," Magistrate Carney said from the bench.

The magistrate shattered all political ties and was reported to have thrown the "maniac" into jail without pause when he predicted General Butler himself will be a prisoner before he unless he is careful.

Magistrate Carney then dismissed eight prisoners who had been arrested on charges of possessing liquor.

"The law of the state says it is a crime to have liquor for sale. There has been no proof of sale in these cases. If the law is wrong that is not up to General Butler. All he has to do is to obey the law himself."

The court's attack came almost at the "zero hour"—3:30 o'clock at which time General Butler had ordered that "the city be absolutely clean."

General Butler refused comment. "I've worked to do it and not politics to play," he said. He said he had shored up the office and was at the apartment here, where he would "hunt" for more police lieutenant's men, he charged, and lied to him.

These officers reported to General Butler that their police districts were cleaned up.

"No district in Philadelphia has been cleaned up. I do not expect the men to do the impossible, but all I have asked is that every police man try—keep raising. I am satisfied with the lieutenants and police who have tried, even though their districts are not fully pure."

General Butler announced his policy for the future.
