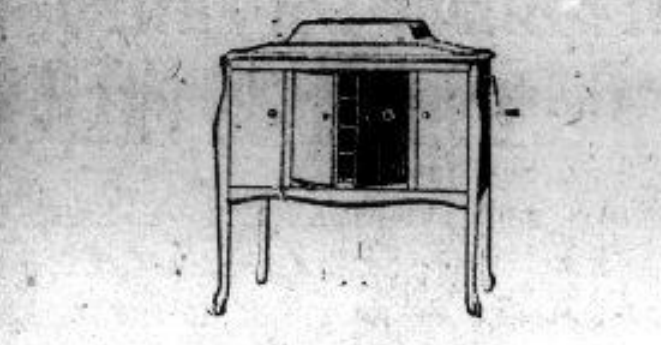

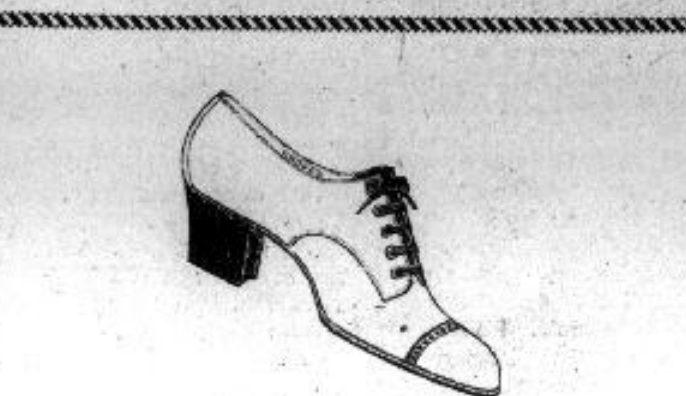

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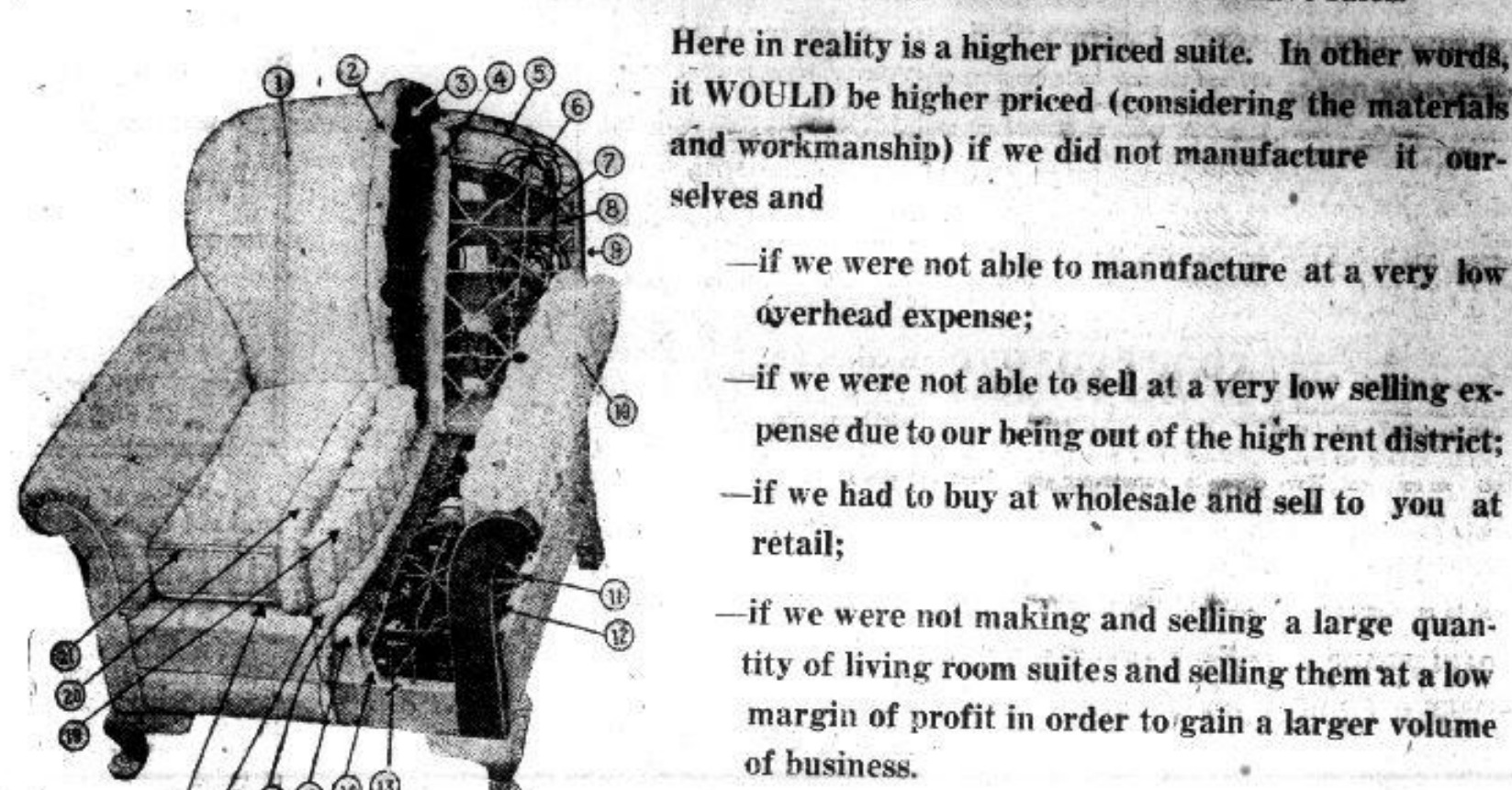

from the hospitalization of veterans by authorizing the admission to Veterans' Bureau hospitals of all veterans suffering from wounds of sickness.

2. Shifting the "burden of proof from the veteran to the government on practically all claims for compensation.

3. Authorizing "contact" officers to safeguard the rights of veterans who claim compensation.

4. Increasing the amount of compensation to disabled veterans under certain circumstances, and to hospitalize sick and wounded.

The most important change to be recommended by the committee will be its proposal to hospitalize all sick or wounded veterans. Under the recommendation, every veteran would have the right to free hospital treatment at the nearest veterans' bureau hospital. He would not have to prove his sickness of service origin. It would also admit thousands of shell shocked and tubercular veterans who are unable to provide exact medical proof that their condition was of military service.

It is generally assumed that the financial condition of the Company has benefited by the recent mild weather conditions.
