"I ran for governor of New York in 1914 and I know the state was flooded with anonymous letters," he said. "It was the cheapest publicity work for \$25,000 I ever knew of."

Has Proven Who Mann Was a real character and not a myth. Mann worked with him in the League's publicity campaign."

The Anti-Saloon League itself has never objected to Anderson's transactions and honored his claim for reimbursement for the \$25,000 King money spent for publicity, Whitman continued. The state's star witness, O. Bernal Phillips, collector for the league from 1917, was bitterly attacked. He said he had been forced to split his commissions with Anderson.

Whitman accused Phillips of "making up his story." Splitting of commissions is "the commonest thing in the world," Whitman declared in defending Anderson's taking care of Phillips' commissions over \$10,000 a year. The entry showing the \$14,000 Anderson got of Phillips' \$18,000 earnings in 1923 as "expense" to Phillips was particularly pointed out.

"The books were foolishly and ungrudgingly handed, it is true, but they were honestly made with honest intent," Whitman declared.

"The \$4,000 was Anderson's share of Phillips' earnings. It was properly credited as expense to Phillips."

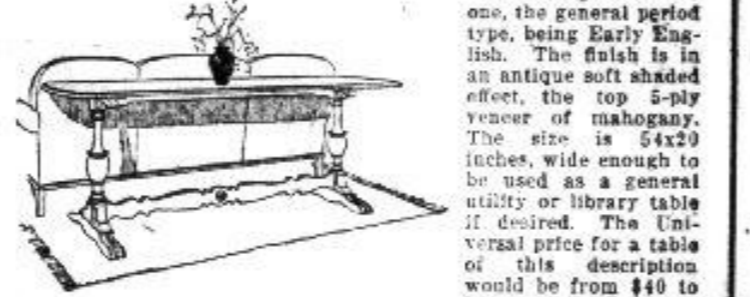
