





### SHENANDOAH MADE LIGHT AND STRONG THROUGH USE OF NEW METAL DURALUMIN

Washington, Feb. 13.—A ten-foot length of the structural framework of the Navy's new night ship, the Shenandoah, is easily raised with a little finger. It is capable of bearing the weight of many men as can be seen from the photo.

This was the verdict placed by Bureau of Standards experts, after a year's experimentation upon the girders employed in building the framework of the Shenandoah. Tests were conducted by the experts upon duplicates of the types of girders used in building the ship—147 in all—which they were subjected to every known hardship which they would meet if used in an airplane.

The results of these tests, it was stated, were remarkably consistent both as to type of failure and break-down. Practically all failures were due to fatigue. They depended chiefly upon the stiffness of the material and were not the result of poor workmanship or defective material.

The importance of these tests, the announcement stated, lies in the assurance of strength which they give to the Shenandoah, and also in the fact that they have furnished such valuable data which will be used in the design of other aircraft.

The girders were made of duralumin, an alloy of aluminum and copper. They are remarkably light, yet strong and durable. A ten-foot length can be easily lifted from the floor by a man's hands, and will bear a load of 100 tons.

Lightness is a necessity in aircraft construction, the announcement stated, as well as strength. It is a fact that the weight of a plane is a very important factor in its design.

These engine tests, the bureau announcement stated, covered all conditions of climatic or altitude which the Shenandoah would be likely to encounter in any flight.

Specialty-constructed chambers were employed by the bureau in testing the engine altitudes above sea level. Air pressure was reduced in the chambers by large vacuum pumps.

It is tentatively planned by the Navy Department to employ the Shenandoah upon the Navy Arctic Expedition over the North Pole this spring, when undoubtedly, it is expected, it will be subjected to hardships as severe as those recently encountered by the Bureau of Standards—the government's scientific research vessel.
