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Walsh Committee Is Battle-Torn Tax Scanning Telegrams For Additional Data

Washington, Feb. 17.—The battle-torn tax reduction bill, which has been in the hands of the committee since it was introduced in the House on Friday, was scanned today by the committee for additional data.

The committee, which is headed by Senator Walsh, is made up of Senators Gibbs, McAdoo, and Clegg. It is expected that the bill will be reported to the Senate in a few days.

The bill provides for a reduction of the tax on income from 24 to 22 percent, and for a reduction of the tax on dividends from 10 to 8 percent. It also provides for a reduction of the tax on gifts from 10 to 6 percent, and for a reduction of the tax on estates from 10 to 8 percent.

NAUGATUCK BANK JANITOR HURT SERIOUSLY IN FOILING BANDIT
