COOLIDGE-JOHNSON PRIMARY RETURNS FAVOR PRESIDENT... South Dakota with Two-Thirds of Returns Counted Show Lead of Less Than Two Thousand Votes.

St. Paul, S. D., March 26.—The first returns received from the Republican caucus in South Dakota today show Coolidge 20,974 and Johnson 18,849 from 598 of the 1,708 precincts in the presidential primary vote.

Earlier returns, compiled by newspapers, had given Coolidge a slightly smaller lead in a larger vote from 547 precinct. Returns from the rural precincts now come in, and are generally expected to better Johnson's standing.

St. Paul, S. D., March 26.—With two-thirds of the Republican caucus returns accounted for President Coolidge held a diminishing lead of less than two thousand votes over Senator Johnson in the South Dakota primary returns today.

McAdoo supporters claimed a two to one victory in the Democratic primary. The precincts reporting were in the cities, which give Coolidge a much heavier lead in the earlier returns. Early today, 547 of the state's 1,708 precincts had reported.

In the fight for the Republican nomination to the United States Senate, Governor McAdoo, who campaigned for Senator Sterling by 2,887 votes, returns from 247 precincts gave McAdoo 5,709; Sterling 3,708.

It was believed that between 65,000 and 70,000 votes were polled in the Republican contest, the final vote will be taken at the North End next Monday evening when Company No. 2 will entertain the players. The red mitre of the cardinalate which is distinct from the biretta which will be conferred on the American cardinals in St. Peter's Cathedral tomorrow at a public consistory. The consistory today imposed the status of seniority of Cardinal Mundelein.

French Cabinet Allocates After Pension Dispute... Foreign Minister, his defeat comes at a critical time as delicate diplomatic negotiations are under way with Great Britain over the forthcoming report of the reparations experts.

Three British ministers have passed out of power since M. Poincare assumed the stewardship of the French government. They were the governments of David Lloyd George, Andrew Bonar Law and Stanley Baldwin.

During all this turbulent period when Germany was retaining reparations payments and the French and Belgium took over the Ruhr, M. Poincare held a steady course, always insisting upon a stern policy towards Germany.

While the chamber supported all the Poincare policies, the political situation developed when he drew up a series of financial reforms increasing all taxes twenty per cent and conferring fiscal dictatorial powers upon himself. His opposition has been growing in strength for the past several months.
