REAL EVIL OF GAMBLING
"Gambling," says Sir Walter
Scott, in the introduction to "St.
Roman's Well," is "a vice which
the devil has contrived to render
all his own, since it is deprived of
whatever pleads an apology for
other vices, and is founded entirely
on the cold-blooded calculation of
the most exclusive selfishness."

The prevalence of the vice calls
for some straight thinking concerning
its injury. To many persons,
including both the "society" women
who play bridge and the street ur-
chins who roll dice to back alters,
do not consider gambling inherently
wrong. Their attitude is that it is
only to be condemned if one loses
more than they can afford to lose.

They ignore the fundamental fact
that gambling at dice and cards
is immoral because it is an attempt
to win money by making somebody
else lose it. There is no way for
the gambler to profit except by
causing his opponent to suffer.

This is the error of the matter
and must be recognized if people
are to be made to believe that
gambling is an evil in itself, inde-
pendently of whether one can afford
to lose. Can one afford to win, or
to try to win, at the expense of another, should rather be asked.

to meet the prices he had set. The
result is the most efficient industry
ever conceived by man—and a fer-

For the young man who, puffed
because his employer does not
"recognize his ability," does not

Breach Between Senate and House is Widened

Washington, March 28.—The breach between the Senate and House caused by inability to agree on tax reduction legislation was widened today by differences over the Soldiers Bonus.

Chairman Green of the House Ways and Means committee charged that a "deliberate effort to misrepresent the cost of the bonus" was being made by the Senate Finance Committee.

Calling attention to a statement that an American Legion survey of the cost of the bonus for military conscripts was \$2,150,000,000 instead of the \$3,200,000,000 figured by the Ways and Means committee, Green said:

"Mr. Hess did not so state. On the contrary his figures are in accord with those of the survey of the Veterans Bureau who estimated \$2,650,000,000 for the insurance certificates. What Mr. Hess did say in effect was that if the payment were not amortized, but were all deferred until the end of the insurance period, they would amount to \$3,200,000,000. 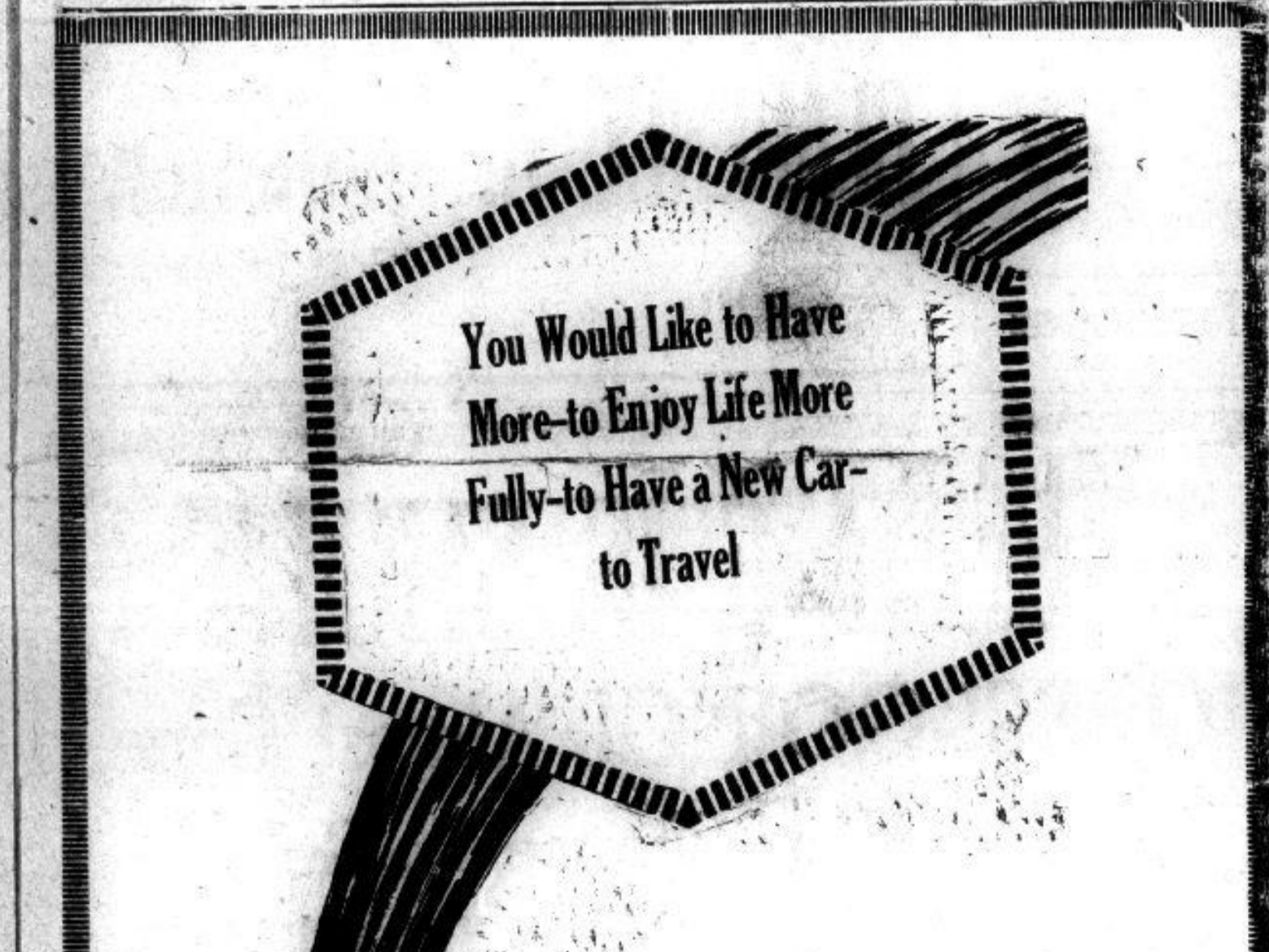
