A resolution sponsored by Senator McKellar, Democrat of Tennessee, directing the judiciary committee to investigate Mellon's fitness and eligibility to hold office, slumbered on the table in the Senate today. The resolution, which has been characterized since its introduction as the latest Presidential "got" on Mellon, is not expected to pass.

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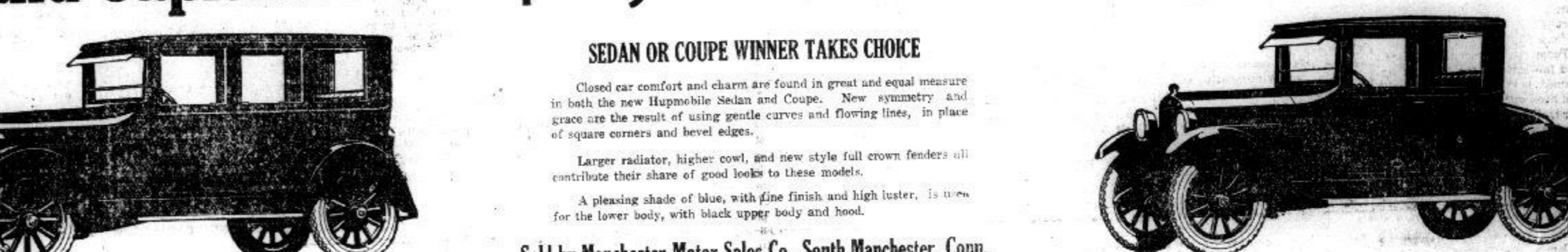
